RESOLUTION #23-13 ENTITLED: Oppose Criminalization of Medical Care SUBMITTED BY: Alison Case MD, Cynthia Heckman-Davis MD, Mary Mahern MD WHEREAS, medical care provision across state lines and the implementation of telemedicine have increased access to healthcare in rural and underserved populations, and WHEREAS, several states have restricted abortion and have threatened access to other reproductive healthcare including contraception, and WHEREAS, several states have passed bills that ban minors from traveling to obtain an abortion without parental consent, and WHEREAS, several states are looking to restrict gender affirming care and its provision, and WHEREAS, some legislation criminalizes the provision of or aid in accessing medical care, and WHEREAS, lack of access to reproductive care has been shown to be harmful to patient outcomes, WHEREAS, lack of access to gender-affirming care has been shown to increase poor mental health outcomes, especially in young people, and WHEREAS, the American Medical Association (AMA) opposes any and all attempts to criminalize health care decision making between a patient and their doctor, and current AMA president Dr. Jack Resneck Jr. has called the criminalization of medicine "extremely dangerous.", and WHEREAS, The American Medical Association (AMA), American Psychiatric Association (APA), American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP), the American College of Physicians (ACP), and the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists (ACOG) have issued statements validating gender affirming care as evidence based medicine, therefore be it RESOLVED, that the Indiana Academy of Family Physicians adopt policy on Criminalization of Medical Practice to read "The Indiana Academy of Family Physicians takes all reasonable and necessary steps to ensure that evidence-based medical decision-making and treatment, exercised in accordance with evidence-based standards of care, does not become a violation of criminal law. This includes criminalization of clinicians, patients, and those who aid patients in receiving reproductive, abortion, or gender affirming health care across state lines.", and be it further RESOLVED, that the Indiana Academy of Family Physicians oppose legislation that would prosecute or otherwise penalize physicians and other clinicians, patients, and those who aid patients in receiving reproductive, abortion, or gender affirming health care across state lines, and be it further RESOLVED, that the Indiana Academy of Family Physicians will collaborate with other state medical associations to provide a united front against further Indiana General Assembly efforts to criminalize medical care, and to educate legislators of the consequences of criminalizing medical care.
