

To Celebrate our 25th Year, we are highlighting 25 things about various groups in Johnson County, topics on leadership, and more over the 2018-2019 year. This month we are highlighting information gained from our recent alumni survey. Results are from the 216 LJC Alumni who completed the survey. We have the best graduates!

- 1. 216 LJC Alumni responded to the engagement survey. Of those:
- 2. 97% still reside in Indiana
- 3. 85% reside in Johnson County
- 4. 72% work in Johnson County
- 5. 79% recruit and/or nominate new class members to the LJC Signature Program
- 6. 56% continue to attend LJC events
- 8. 72% continue to support LJC either financially or through volunteering
- 9. 95% follow LJC on Facebook
- 10. Ongoing class community projects continue an average of 2 years beyond completion
- 11. 159 Alumni are still actively involved in Non-Profit Organizations
- 12. 59 Alumni are still actively involved in Governmental Organizations And also, did you know...
- 13. LJC averages 55% Alumni Engagement from Signature Program participants
- 14. 634 Sponsors and Donors gave to LJC in 2017-2018
- 15. 30 Nonprofits and over 200 community members attended the All Aboard Community Volunteer and Board Fair
- 16. 711 people attended LJC Select Workshops during the 2017-2018 program year
- 17. We now have almost 700 graduates from the LJC Signature Program
- 18. 38% of Signature Program graduates gave to LJC in 2017-2018 helping us meet our fundraising goal for the 17th year in a row
- 19. We brought in 117 guest speakers for LJC Signature and Select programs

Civil Rights Activist to Speak as Part of Diversity Lecture Series



Franklin College will welcome civil rights activist and author Troy Jackson, Ph.D., to campus for the second lecture of the 2018-19 Power of Diversity Lecture Series. Jackson will speak at 6:30 p.m. on Tuesday, Nov. 13, in Richardson Chapel.

The series includes four programs hosted by local and national diversity advocates who aim to inspire campus dialogue, community engagement and civic education. The events are free and open to the public.

Jackson's lecture is titled "Multi-Racial Organizing for Change." His talk will explore how organizing centers for women of color in broad based coalitions has offered a recipe for transformative democracy. Examples include the Montgomery Bus Boycott in the 1950s and the Senate election in Alabama in 2017. By exploring his academic work on Montgomery in the 1950s and his experience organizing faith communities for racial justice in Ohio and around the country, Jackson will offer an analysis of the true power of diversity.

Jackson is the state strategies director for Faith in Action, a national organization that promotes state and local grassroots organizing efforts pressing for social reform.

The Power of Diversity Lecture Series is presented by the Franklin College Center for Diversity and Inclusion. It was established in 2017 by the Office of the President.
