How to keep your remote workers engaged in challenging times

As I work with organizations during Covid-19, I'm struck by how many say their teams are more cohesive than before.

This isn't an accident! These managers developed strategies and habits to connect people. Here are some of their tips.

→ Reinforce common goals.

When we don't see customers regularly, it's easy to forget our "why". Motivation comes from knowing that our work is important and appreciated. Take time to celebrate your team's accomplishments in 2020. Then set group goals for 2021, and celebrate progress. Having a shared purpose keeps people on the same page.

\rightarrow Have a good fight.

Productive teams use ground rules to embrace debate. Learning decisionmaking strategies together ahead of time keeps people engaged. So regularly appoint a Devil's Advocate (rotate that assignment amongst members so it doesn't turn personal). Always brainstorm multiple options before deciding. But keep a sense of humor - take the work seriously, but not yourselves.



→ Make personal connections.

Are you still making an effort to really ask if everyone's OK? Do your meetings have a "mental wellness check in"? It's easy to slip into efficient "work only" conversations, but maintaining personal ties is a smart time commitment. A recent EY study found almost 40% of workers felt a greater sense of belonging at work when colleagues "checked in" on both personal and professional matters. Simply asking, "How are you?" or "How can I support you?" makes a big impact. "Coffee chats" – quick online conversations where work talk is prohibited – also help maintain positive relationships.

It takes thought and effort – but you can keep your remote team connected.
