KANSAS CHAPTER

REINSTALLED

DECEMBER 9, 2023

Nearly 104 years after it first became a chartered chapter of Delta Upsilon, the Kansas Chapter rejoined the Fraternity's active chapter roll when its Reinstallation Ceremony was held on Dec. 9, 2023.

Held in the Bruckmiller Room of the Adams Alumni Center at the University of Kansas, the location was the perfect backdrop for the event as décor in the building highlights the pride alumni have to be a Jayhawk—a pride Kansas Chapter alumni also have for being a DU.

More than 50 alumni and guests, including University of Kansas Chancellor Douglas Gilrod, were on hand for the Reinstallation, which also included the Initiation of 25 new brothers into the chapter.

The history of the Kansas Chapter can be traced back to 1912 with the formation of a campus society called "Kanza." With the help of Goldwin Goldsmith, *Columbia 1896*, who served KU as the head of the Department of Agriculture, Kanza successfully petitioned Delta Upsilon for membership and was chartered on Jan. 10, 1920, as the 51st chapter of Delta Upsilon.

Over the next 98 years, the Kansas Chapter became a stalwart within the Fraternity, regularly receiving DU accolades and initiating more than 1,900 men, many of whom would go on to serve as outstanding businessmen, leaders and Fraternity volunteers. However, a series of Fraternity Loss Prevention violations forced the chapter to close in 2018, two years shy of its centennial celebration.

In fall 2022, four years after the chapter's closure, the Fraternity began its expansion recruitment efforts to reestablish the Kansas Chapter. Thanks to the generous support of chapter alumni, the group quickly began to take shape and make a name for itself on campus. The Associate Chapter Ceremony was held on Nov. 12, 2022. Over the next year, the associate chapter would continue to recruit new members, move back into the chapter house, and establish a foundation for operational success. While many associate chapters can take two years or more to meet chartering requirements, the Kansas Associate Chapter did so within just one year and was officially reinstalled on Dec. 9, 2023.

According to Kenzy Rolley, *Kansas* '25, who served as Chapter President at the time of the Reinstallation, Kansas Associate Chapter members and alumni were all on the same





page regarding being able to recharter as soon as possible. Together, the undergraduates and alumni advisors worked to make that dream a reality.

"We wouldn't be who we are without our alumni support," Rolley said. "You can really tell that our alums are focused on *Building Better Men*, and having them trust us in that vision is invaluable."

During the Reinstallation and Initiation ceremonies, the Ritual team consisted of Delta Upsilon Executive Director Justin Kirk, *Boise State '00*, as Master; Grant Kaufman, *Kansas '92*, as Examiner; Rod Barleen, *Kansas '96*, as Chief Marshal; and Marty Kennan, *Kansas '82*, as Chaplain. Todd Slawson, *Kansas '84*, gave The Charge Address.

Slawson, a double legacy of the Kansas Chapter (father Donald Slawson, *Kansas* '55; grandfather Charles Slawson, *Kansas* 1920, who was an original charter member of the Kansas Chapter) spoke of the chapter's storied history, its future, and the pride all Kansas Chapter alumni have in seeing the chapter's charter restored. In fact, many of the alumni in attendance were overcome with emotion as a symbolic charter was presented back to the chapter during the event.

Rolley and the other Kansas undergraduates share the alumni's excitement for the future.

"I see the Kansas DUs becoming the strong chapter it once was on campus," Rolley said. "Through hard work and determination, with increasing social connections and academics, we will be right where we belong as one of the flagship chapters at KU and within DU."

As is customary with all Reinstallations and new Installations, the Kansas Chapter will receive its official new charter during the 2024 Leadership Institute in Atlanta, held Aug. 2-4.

150 LA SON OF SYRACUSE DELTA UPSILON

As one of Delta Upsilon's Four Founding Principles, The Promotion of Friendship is perhaps the most pure and fundamental value we hold. College friendships turn into lifelong relationships, and the shared experience of being a DU unites men from across generations. This is the case for all Delta Upsilon chapters, and it has been evident in the Syracuse Chapter for 150 years.

The weekend of Oct. 6-8, 2023, the Syracuse Chapter celebrated its brotherhood with a 150th anniversary celebration that welcomed more than 120 brothers to campus.

Delta Upsilon's 22nd chapter was first installed on Nov. 14, 1873, and was one of the first fraternities at Syracuse. (In 1871, Delta Kappa Epsilon became the first fraternity at Syracuse.) The chapter stood for 98 years before closing in 1971. It would reopen in 1976 for another 20 years before closing again in 1996; and it would reopen once again with its latest Reinstallation Ceremony held on Jan. 27, 2018.

Whether the chapter has been open or closed, the Syracuse alumni have always been keen to keep the bonds of brotherhood alive. The alumni chapter has remained one of Delta Upsilon's strongest for decades, even earning the Fraternity's Outstanding Alumni Chapter Award in 2018. So it came as no surprise that the alumni would plan a large scale anniversary reunion to honor the chapter's sesquicentennial.

Talks of a celebration began in January 2023 during an alumni chapter call attended by 95 alumni. Keeping the

Syracuse football schedule in mind, plans truly began to take shape after a date was chosen that would avoid the logistical challenges of hosting an event on a weekend with a home game. From that point on, alumni were kept abreast of plans via regular emails, social media posts and the chapter's newsletter. The Bazoo.

A welcome reception was hosted at the chapter house on Friday evening, Oct. 6, where alumni had the opportunity to connect with undergraduates before hitting the town and favorite Syracuse establishments. On Saturday, the Dikaia Foundation Board, which annually grants more than \$25,000 to undergraduate brothers, hosted a meeting and visited Bird Library to explore its archive of Delta Upsilon memorabilia. Later that day, a golf tournament was held at Drumlins Country Club, and a football viewing party was held at Faegans. Finally, a gala at the Collegian Hotel & Suites was held Saturday evening with speeches, stories and laughter. The weekend ended with brunch at the Sheraton Syracuse University Hotel & Conference Center.

"The 150-year celebration was more than a commemoration of the past; it was a testament to the enduring bonds of brotherhood," said Andrew Schirmer, *Syracuse* '84. "These enduring relationships enrich the fabric of our Fraternity and contribute to its vibrancy."

The planning committee was led by Mark "Minty" Linnan, Syracuse '85, and included Mateo Diaz, Syracuse '17; Vinny DiPaola, Syracuse '18; Rick Holland, Syracuse '83; Ken Hyman, Syracuse '88; and ET Tecosky, Syracuse '91.

VIRGINIA TECH UNIVERSITY

Blacksburg, Virginia
Original Charter Date: March 5, 1983

Expansion efforts to reestablish the Virginia Tech Chapter began in August 2023, with DU Leadership Consultant Tommy Valenti, *Boise State* '22, leading the efforts.

The chapter originally chartered in 1983 and closed in 2013.

The group held its Associate Chapter Ceremony on Nov. 8, 2023, and continues to recruit new members and work toward chartering requirements. The Virginia Tech Associate Chapter has 21 associate members as of April 9, 2024.



UNIVERSITY OF WASHINGTON

Seattle, Washington Original Charter Date: Dec. 9, 1910

Delta Upsilon began expansion efforts at the University of Washington in late September 2023, with DU Leadership Consultant Russell Briggs, *Boise State* '23, leading the efforts.

The chapter originally chartered in 1910 and closed in 2018.

As of April 9, 2024, the group has eight associate members. Working closely with the Washington Chapter alumni, recruitment efforts continue, and alumni have established an academic scholarship program for potential new members, as well as scholarships to cover joining fees for anyone who joins the associate chapter this academic year.



IDAHO STATE UNIVERSITY

Pocatello, Idaho NEW CHAPTER!

During the fall 2023 semester, an interest group at Idaho State University approached Delta Upsilon about affiliating with the International Fraternity. In late fall 2023 and early spring 2024, DU staff met with the interest group and officially started an expansion project on campus.

Throughout the spring term, staff has continued to work with the group to recruit additional new members, gain campus recognition, identify chapter advisors and more. As of April 9, 2024, the group has 17 associate members.

Brother Nicholas Giorgianni, *Kent State* '56, passed away on Jan. 26, 2024, just two days shy of his 90th birthday.

Born on Jan. 28, 1934, to Frank and Mary Giorgianni, Nick was an alumnus of John Adams High School and Kent State University. He served in the U.S. Army before beginning his career, which was primarily with the companies Sohio and BP America.

Since his Initiation, Delta Upsilon held a warm place in Brother Giorgianni's heart. He served on the Delta Upsilon International Fraternity Board of Directors from 1991-1994 and received the DU's Founders Medal in 2005 for his dedication to the International Fraternity and the Kent State Chapter.

Brother Giorgianni is survived by his wife Alda; son Mark, *Kent State* '91, daughter Lisa, and son Paul.

Brother Elmer Lee Musil, *Kansas State* '71, passed away on Jan. 25, 2024. Born on Sept. 22, 1949, he spent his life as a farmer, cattleman, seedsman, journalist and community leader.

Brother Musil earned bachelor's and master's degrees in agricultural journalism from Kansas State while serving in the ROTC and member of the freshman cross country and track team.

Lee was an avid supporter of Delta Upsilon, serving as a member of the Kansas State Alumni Corporation for many years, as well as the longtime editor of the Kansas State Chapter's alumni magazine, *The Avenger*. He and his wife, Carolyn, also endowed the Rural Education Scholarship through the Delta Upsilon Educational Foundation to support K-State DUs coming from rural areas. Upon his passing, this fund was merged with a gift honoring Brother Glenn Mull, *Kansas State* '73, and is now known as the Musil-Mull Legacy Scholarship with the dual intention of recruiting men from rural areas into the chapter and providing the Kansas State Chapter with scholarships to DU educational programs.

Brother Musil's wife, Carolyn, passed away two months following his death. The couple is survived by their son Richard, and grandchildren Conner and Briezlyn.

"Lee's life and actions personify Delta Upsilon's Four Founding Principles of Friendship, Character, Culture and Justice" said Frank York, Kansas State '71. "Lee took great pride utilizing his journalism degree with his work on The Avenger, which highlighted not only the undergraduate news, but also stories of alumni brothers' successes. Alumni always looked forward to Lee's publications. Lee was a strong proponent for Delta Upsilon's mission of Building Better Men, creating a culture and legacy of excellence through personal example."

Oklahoma '52

Brother Benjamin Walkingstick, *Oklahoma* '52, passed away on Dec. 27, 2023, leaving behind a legacy of success, charity and civic duty.


Born on Oct. 29, 1930, Brother Walkingstick graduated from the University of Oklahoma with a degree in business before serving two years in the U.S. Air Force. In 1963, he began a 60-year career in banking, eventually taking helm of Union National Bank, one of the oldest banks in the state of Oklahoma. He also started multiple other businesses, including insurance agencies and realty groups.

Fiercely proud of his Cherokee heritage, Brother Walkingstick named his cattle ranch Cherokee Farms and was a supporter of Seminole State College, where he served eight years on the Board of Regents (including one year as president), created a scholarship, and sponsored the construction of a new student union. He has also donated millions of dollars to his alma mater and served eight years on the board of Prince Business College at OU.

He is survived by his wife Bonnie, four children, 12 grandchildren, 20 great-grandchildren, and two great-grandchildren.

Brother Walkingstick received Delta Upsilon's highest honor, the Distinguished Delta Upsilon Award, in 2003 and was a generous supporter of the Oklahoma Chapter. Those across Oklahoma and within Delta Upsilon remember him with fondness.

"Generosity goes beyond monetary gifts. It encompasses kindness and the impact one makes on other people's lives," said International Fraternity Board Member Tim Dowd, Oklahoma '75. "Ben's time and his financial gifts have had a major impact on the Oklahoma Chapter and created positive ripples in the lives of the numerous men who came through the chapter. Whenever the Oklahoma Chapter needed help, Ben was always willing to help. He was truly dedicated to DU."



Oregon '48

Brother John Weisel, *Oregon '48*, passed away on Dec. 2, 2023, at the age of 97. Born on June 27,1926, he led a distinguished career as an ophthalmologist.

Dr. Weisel received his bachelor's and medical degrees from the University of Oregon and joined the staff of Medical Eye Center in the late 1950s. He was an early pioneer in cataract removal and lens implantation, and his work contributed to the approval of the intraocular lens by the FDA. Dr. Weisel traveled the world lecturing to other doctors and teaching them to perform the delicate surgery of removing cataract-damaged lenses and replacing them with plastic ones. He was a Fellow of the American College of Surgeons.

Dr. Weisel was a long-time supporter and volunteer with Delta Upsilon. In addition to his support of the Oregon Chapter, he served as an Alumni Director on the International Fraternity Board of Directors from 1991-1995 and on the Educational Foundations Board of Trustees from 1999 to the time of his death. In 2009, he received the Distinguished Delta Upsilon Award, the highest award the Fraternity presents to an alumnus.

"John's kindhearted presence on both the DUIF and DUEF Boards stemmed from his positive undergraduate experience and his fervent desire to make DU even stronger for future generations," said Craig Franz, Bucknell '75, current Vice-Chairman of the DU Educational Foundation and past Chairman of the International Fraternity. "In those meetings, he was a steady, solid, and effective advocate for strengthening undergraduate programs."


