Mr. Criss was also the founding President and CEO of Indiana Connected by 25 (now called Foster Success). Foster Success is a local United Way community partner that empowers Indiana foster youth to make successful transitions to adulthood.

"We are excited for Sam to join the Tangram team as the new CEO," Eva Marquez, Tangram's board chair, said. "Sam brings a unique combination of leadership experiences, business entrepreneurship and a broad network that will be critical for growing Tangram's influence while navigating the always challenging and always changing health care environment."

In his position as President and CEO for Tangram, Criss will lead the organization and ensure that continual progress is made towards strategic goals, as well as the organization's mission of identifying innovative solutions to challenges faced by individuals with disabilities, with the goal of building a more inclusive community.
