



JCPL's Trafalgar Branch began as a library station in 1983. In 1998 the station became a library when it moved into an old bank in downtown Trafalgar. Planning for a new library building began in 2004 with groundbreaking taking place in March 2006. The "library on the prairie" opened in November 2007. The branch features a native prairie offering the opportunity for you to explore the outdoors while also learning. The grasses of the -dith prairie provide an ecologically friendly alternative to traditional landscaping while providing a home to birds, bees, bunnies and other animals. It is maintained by professionals who specialize



The history of the original Johnson County Public Library can be traced to Franklin's first library. The Franklin Public Library opened on December 5, 1911, in a room on the second story of a downtown building. In 1915, with a \$17,500 Carnegie grant, the construction of a new library began. Franklin's Carnegie Library opened in April 1916 at the corner of Madison and Home Avenue. The current Franklin branch opened in 1988, and of the library is home to the JCPL Historical Room. The primary focus of the

collection is Johnson County history and genealogy. It also has numerous resources for other Indiana counties, Indiana in general, and other states. The Historical Room also provides access to the Indiana Digital Archives, Indianapolis Star/News and Johnson County newspaper archives.

WWPL first opened on April 15, 1902 in a storeroom on North Union Street with approximately 700 volumes. The library later moved to South Union Street until 1910, when a donation from the Andrew Carnegie Foundation was received. Westfield's Carnegie Library was built on Main Street, and was the first Carnegie Library in Hamilton County. In 1983 the library moved to its current location. New additions were added to the building in 1995 and 2014, making its current size just over 32,000 this library, square feet. Westfield's population and need for library services continues to grow at a rapid pace-- WWPL currently circulates over 400,000 physical materials! The next few years will be a very exciting chapter for WWPL as its new building is constructed.







HMMPL, originally known as the Eagle Township Library, was established in 1896 with \$600 from the estate of Joseph B. Pitzer. Later renamed, the Zionsville Library received an endowment gift from the Lora Hussey estate in 1962. The library moved locations and became a private institution for the following 26 years. In 1988 the Zionsville Library became public again, and was later renamed Hussey-Mayfield Memorial Public Library to honor the contributions of both Hussey and Iona-time Friends of the Library member, Mary Mayfield. Aided by the contributions of Hussey's cousin Olive Hoffman, the library moved to its current location, 2006 renovations well ibran, expanded the library to its current size. In the spring of 2022, HMMPL broke around on a new branch in Whitestown-- expected to

open in 2023! HMMPL is a member of Evergreen Indiana and offers more than 135,000 physical items, as well as countless digital materials and resources. The MakerStudio was recently opened, allowing patrons access to a 3D printer, video and sound editing software, sewing and embroidery machines, a vinyl cutter, and more!

JCPL's Clark Pleasant Branch began as the Break-O-Day Branch Library in 1996. In 2002, the branch relocated to an office park in New Whiteland, where it remained for the next 20 years! The branch moved to its current location in March of 2022. The branch features a children's room, a STEAM Zone Robotics Learning Lab featuring programs for all ages, and a dedicated teen space - complete with video games! The branch also offers a large community room for the

Whiteland, New Whiteland and Johnson County residents as a place to meet. Outside the Library, you will find a nature trail that encircles the Branch. It is surrounded by native trees and grasses. A community garden and an Exploration Walk will be added to the trail in the future.







JCPL's White River Branch began as a library station in November 1980. By 1987, the area had grown substantially meaning a new branch was needed to serve the community. Groundbreaking was held in February with a ribbon-cutting ceremony a year later in February 1988. A distinctive feature of the Branch is the Certified Wildlife Habitat located behind the Branch. Large windows on the back of the Library allow patrons to this library to view a collection of bird feeders, a bird bath (heated in the winter), a wren house, a downy woodpecker

house, a hummingbird feeder and a nesting box attached to the window allowing you to see inside the box. It is all nestled against a forested area. The White River Branch is a nature oasis in the middle of a suburban area.

Funded by Andrew Carnegie, LPL opened in June 1905 and has served its patrons in the same location ever since. In 1963, the city library merged with Center Township and the Town of Ulen. By the end of the 1980s, LPL had outgrown its original building. Rather than move, the library chose to construct an addition which opened in 1991 - so that the library could remain in the same location. A decade later more space was needed and ary in this library, is significant, another addition was opened in 2006, putting the library in the shape it is today. The Ralph W. Stark Heritage Center occupies the main floor of the original building. The Heritage Center houses an extensive collection of local history and genealogical resources. With a Children's, Teen, and Main Circulation department, LPL offers services to all ages. LPL even extends its services beyond the library's walls through outreach!



In 1916, Mr. and Mrs. Sylvester Moore felt that Brownsburg should have its own public library. They, along with Mr. and Mrs. William Evans, visited the Coatesville Library to learn how Brownsburg might secure a public library. Mr. Sanborn, secretary of the Library Commission, helped them formulate their plans. With taxpayer funding, funds borrowed from the local bank, and a \$12,500 gift from the Carnegie Corporation, the cornerstone of the library was laid in September of 1917. One year later, the library opened with this library, 400 books! Ottie Roberts was the sole librarian until 1944. The library eventually outgrew the Carnegie building, and, in 1981, relocated to its current location.

Renovated in 2019, the library now has over 50,000 square feet to explore! Featuring nine study rooms, Wi-Fi, a walking path with StoryWalk® around the building, tons of books in all formats, and great programs there's a lot to do!

The Mooresville Public Library is celebrating the conception of our town's library this year, marking its 110th anniversary! On July 14, 1855, the 79 members of the Hovey Institute and Workmen's Library Association organized Mooresville's first library, In 1911, citizens rallied to establish a town public library, and a special committee was established to present a library development plan to the Mooresville Board of Town Trustees. The Trustees established a Library Board, which was able to secure \$10,000 in funding from the Carnegie Corporation to construct the library. The 4,000 square foot facility provided shelving for 6,000 books and an assembly room with over 200 seating capacity. In 1988, Mooresville Public Library moved to a new 12,000 square foot facility at 220 West Harrison Street. Today, the library's expanded facility offers 24,500 square feet! The expanded and renovated library offers an 18-station computer lab, a mini-lab for instructional training, a this libran separate Young Adult room, three individual study rooms, a Friends of the Library store, a community room, and a café. Mooresville Public Library strives to offer valued library materials, programs, and technology to help create and support lifelong learning. MPL offers wireless access to the Internet, free faxing, over 70,000





Plainfield's first public library facility opened June 4, 1901, in rented rooms at 120 East Main Street. A group of private citizens, incorporated as the Plainfield Library Association, gathered 414 gift books for public use and started the Plainfield Public Library. Coal oil lamps lit the Reading Room at night. Almost as soon as the Town of Plainfield was incorporated in the spring of 1905, the Library Association gave its new building, completely furnished, to the town. The library requested and received a financial gift from Andrew Carnegie to build a new, larger library, and on January 27, 1913 the library moved into the Carnegie building at 120 South Center Street. After 55 years in the old Carnegie building, the library moved again to the building at the corner of Simmons Street and Stafford Road opened on October 14, 1968. The building

has undergone an expansion and several remodels and remains at this location today.

The library has a robust Indiana and local history collection, engaging Children's Room and Teen Central location, thousands of eBook and eAudiobooks, a Library of Things collection, a Book Bike and Library Vehicle for community outreach, PGTPL To Go, Home Delivery service, and much more!



The Danville-Center Township Public Library began in 1902 with a donation of \$10,000 from Andrew Carnegie, making the first Carnegie library in Hendricks County! The cornerstone of the library was placed in the fall of 1902, with the building being completed in the summer of 1903. In 1928 Center Township joined the Town of Danville, creating the Danville-Center Township Public Library. The library originally offered 1,000 books, but today offers over 60,000- serving over 14,000 citizens of Danville and Center Township. 



The original Coatesville-Clay Township Public Library was located above the bank at the corner of Milton and Main Streets. It started in 1912 with 454 books and fifteen dollars in cash donations. In 1913, an application was made for a Carnegie Fund, and was granted. By June 1916, the new Carnegie building was the home of the Library. In 1948, the building was destroyed by a tornado, causing the library to share a building with the town and fire department until constructing the current building in September of and s.



The Clayton-Liberty Township Public Library was founded in 1929 and established by the Clayton Chapter of the Delphian Society and offered approximately 500 books. Only occupying 600 square feet, the original building utilized a repurposed bank until 1985. A land donation was granted from Frank and Edna Barnes, and a new building was constructed to house the books which are still in use today. Nearing the library's centennial,

Clayton-Liberty Township Public Library now serves a thriving community of roughly 6,000 residents of the township. The library has a local archive area, a wonderful Children's Area, Teen Room, study rooms, Library of Things collection, and engaging programs for all ages.
