NEW MEMBER PARTICIPATION MANUAL

Welcome to the beginning of your journey toward living a life of excellence guided by the mission, values and principles of Delta Tau Delta. It is not an obligation to be taken lightly. Many young men join social fraternities on campuses across North America for a variety of reasons. Some join for purely social reasons, to make new friends, to have a good time, and think very little of the other obligations—taking an oath to become a better man for the rest of your life. While there will be many memories and friendships developed throughout your lifetime, the true meaning of Delta Tau Delta can best be found in adherence to her guiding principles and the bonds formed with fellow men who abide by the values found within the Ritual and the Delt Creed.

Indeed, true brotherhood awaits you! However, there is much you must learn for yourself of Delta Tau Delta. Her priceless wisdom and her greatest joys will not be thrust upon you, but will only come through hard work, dedication and labor for the good and the beautiful. Delta Tau Delta's new member education process is one in which you will experience no physical hardships, psychological strain or hazing of any kind. The Fraternity does not condone hazing or any other behavior toward any member—whether a new member, initiated member or a active alumnus. However, you would be foolish to interpret your new member education process as a period in which you will not be required to test yourself or be challenged. There is a high level of standards and expectations for membership that must be maintained from the moment you pledge yourself to Delta Tau Delta to the time you enter Chapter Eternal. There is not "inactive" status with Delta Tau Delta. All members, both undergraduate and alumni, are expected to be active participants in the Fraternity.

So what is the role of the new member in Delta Tau Delta? It is an opportunity for you to learn about the working customs of the Fraternity, the operations of your chapter, and reflect upon the person you are today and your define your values. A Delt must know himself first–his desires, his dreams, his goals and his values–before he can become an affective initiate. Lifelong learning and growth is vital and the first aspect of your journey on the road and this portion of your membership education has been appropriately titled "Learning."

Not only will you be asked to learn about yourself, your values and your goals, but you will also be tasked with learning as much about your new found brothers as possible. Brotherhood is built upon mutual trust and respect in striving toward common goals fueled by shared values and aspirations. The shared values and aspirations of a Delt are found within our principles of Truth, Courage, Faith and Power as well as within the words and meaning of the Delt Creed. Your period as a new member is brief and soon you will be greeted as a fully initiated brother of Delta Tau Delta. Use this time to learn as much about the Fraternity as you can. Your obligation to Delta Tau Delta is a serious undertaking. We charge you by your dedication and labor to champion Delta Tau Delta to be the premier Fraternity on your campus.

Your role as a new member is simple:

- Live your life by the values and principles of Delta Tau Delta
- Abide by the five obligations of a Delt
- Attend meetings and pay your dues on time
- New members are only expected to do the same things expected of initiated members
- Learn, ask questions and listen to the advice of your mentors and advisors

OBJECTIVES OF THE NEW MEMBER EDUCATION PROGRAM

At the time of the founding of Delta Tau Delta, our founders did not have an elaborate new member education process. When Henry K. Bell traveled to Canonsburg, Pennsylvania on the night of February 22, 1861 to indoctrinate and initiate Rhodes S. Sutton and Samuel S. Brown of Jefferson College, there was no eight week new member process but rather the foundation of the Fraternity was built upon the shoulders of two men who shared the same values and embodied the Delt spirit. After conducting the Ritual, Sutton and Brown were fully initiated members of Delta Tau Delta and carried the banner of the Fraternity as the other three chapters at that time (Gamma Prime – West Liberty, Delta – Monongahela Academy, and Theta Founding – Bethany College) succumbed to the hardships of the Civil War. So if our founders did not have a new member period, how did they instill loyalty, dedication and commitment to Delta Tau Delta Tau Delta in the newest initiates? Since being a member of a fraternity was often a punishable crime on campuses during the 19th century, our founders selected young men who embodied the ideals and principles of Delta Tau Delta much the same way you should only recruit and select men who will make excellent Delts – this has not changed since our founding.

However, just because someone accepts a bid, or even takes the Oath of a Delt, does not mean they are instantly a great or even a good member. The true Delt shows his dedication, love and loyalty to the Fraternity through practical everyday service and scholastic achievement. This new member education program is not designed to force loyalty into new members through hazing or psychological abuse. The objectives of the Delta Tau Delta new member education program are simple and straightforward. By conducting your new member education program as prescribed in this manual, your new members will:

- Create a sense of obligation to Delta Tau Delta, your campus and the community
- Cultivate and develop leadership skills including responsibility and accountability
- Produce loyalty to Delta Tau Delta, your institution, and your chapter
- Provide an atmosphere that encourages academic excellence
- Challenge each member to reach his full potential by encouraging individual creativity rather than group conformity
- Involve each member's family in the Delta Tau Delta experience

Through your full participation in this program, you will have the opportunity to become a committed passionate member who is loyal to your chapter and actively participates in all activities, comes to chapter meetings, pays dues on time, and remains active in the chapter through graduation and beyond. This is the blueprint for a successful chapter and a successful Delt. This is the path leading to a life of excellence. This is the road of knowledge – smoothed by the love of your brothers – The Road of Delta Tau Delta.

THE ROLE OF YOUR NEW MEMBER EDUCATOR

The new member educator will have the opportunity to play many roles over the next few months. More importantly, as a pilot chapter, it is imperative for you to be familiar and comfortable with the roles of your new member educator. You should be able to ask your new member educator to assist you and your fellow brothers in a variety of roles.

EDUCATOR

His primary role is to educate the new member on information needed to be a successful member of the Fraternity and to help you learn the habits of success in college. To ensure this happens, you should give your new member educator the respect you would give a professor. Many of you have different learning styles, personal stories and various knowledge of the fraternity system. You will need to work with the new member educator to immerse yourself fully in the Delta Tau Delta experience.

FACILITATOR

A facilitator is different than an educator. The facilitator engages participants through promoting questions and allowing participants to learn from each other. The facilitator doesn't provide all of the answers, but asks good questions.

COLLABORATOR

Many individuals play a role in the pilot new member education program. You will need to familiarize yourself with the roles each officer, advisor, alumnus and campus partner plays and understand their expectations for your involvement and learning.

PLANNER

Several meetings include inviting guest speakers to present on various topics. It is important that you maintain a positive, gentlemanly decorum throughout all presentations and give all guests speakers, chapter officers, alumni and advisor your utmost respect during these sessions. Remember, they are giving of their time and talents for your betterment.

MENTOR

Your New Member Educator will sever as a mentor for many of you. While you will also receive a Big Brother who will serve as your official mentor, it is important to understand that many initiated Delts will help mentor your development throughout your undergraduate years. This mentorship starts with your New Member Educator and the other officers on The Road Committee. They will model the way and lead by example.



THE MISSION AND VALUES OF DELTA TAU DELTA FRATERNITY

The Mission and Values of the Fraternity are a public representation of our core values contained within our Ritual. Our mission is simple but straightforward, "Committed to Lives of Excellence." Our members should be committed to living lives that reflect themselves, the Fraternity and every part of their being to a level of excellence. We as a Fraternity are dedicated to helping men achieve this level of excellence in their own lives.

The four fundamental principles of Delta Tau Delta are Truth, Courage, Faith and Power.

Truth is fundamental to any organization, but truth is particularly critical to Delta Tau Delta because honest relationships are mandatory for brotherhood. Telling the truth to yourself and others is fundamental to your commitment to a life of personal and professional excellence.

Courage means aggressively taking on challenges and being a leader in the face of adversity. It means caring for the lives of the people around you and understanding that sometimes saying no is a necessary act of responsibility and love for your brothers and the Fraternity as a whole.

Faith is a belief in yourself that what you are doing is right. Whether your faith comes from yourself, your parents or your God is up to you. Faith also means being loyal and trusting among people. It means knowing that people will make correct choices and decisions provided they have the necessary information and they understand the consequences of their actions.

Power is the inherent ability and talents of each member as valuable resources. These qualities and talents give Delta Tau Delta the power and energy to continue looking and moving toward a grand future.

In addition to the four principles of Delta Tau Delta, there are five phrases that complete our system of values.

Integrity is Essential: Integrity means doing what you say you will do. Integrity establishes credibility for yourself and the Fraternity, and having it means that others can trust you, believe you and count on you.

Accountability is Fundamental to all Commitments: Accountability means holding to your promises, making you responsible for both your words and your actions.

Lifelong Learning and Growth are Vital: There is no status quo in the pursuit of excellence. You are either moving ahead through continuous growth and learning, or going backward and slowly narrowing your choices and opportunities in life. There is no point in today's world where one can afford to stop learning and growing.

Strengthening Community is Essential to our Vitality: The pursuit of a life of excellence must occur through constant interactions with many different communities. Therefore, a strong community is vital for your future, as well as the Fraternity's.

Brotherhood Sustains Us: Delta Tau Delta is an organization that relies on brotherhood to hold us together. Brotherhood involves individual responsibility to one's self and to others.

The value statements of Delta Tau Delta are evident in everything we do and say. Our values shape our decisions, our programs and our future.
