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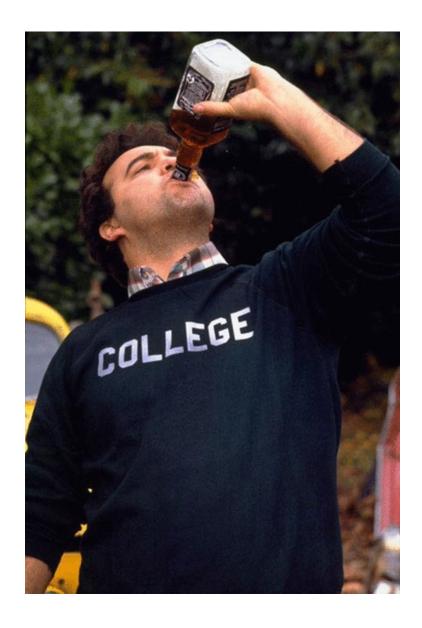


"When we say college, you say..."

And this could be any degree or credential, from a <u>certificate</u> to a two- or four-year degree.

But why would you need one?



Between 2008 and 2018, The U.S. economy will create 46.8 million job openings from new jobs and retirement.

29.8 million of these job vacancies will be for those with postsecondary credentials.

16 million will require a bachelors degree.

Only 17.9 million will be for high school graduates and dropouts.

63% of job openings will require some postsecondary training beyond high school by 2018.

It is important that students have access to an affordable way to "credential" that prior learning (and that's where we come in)



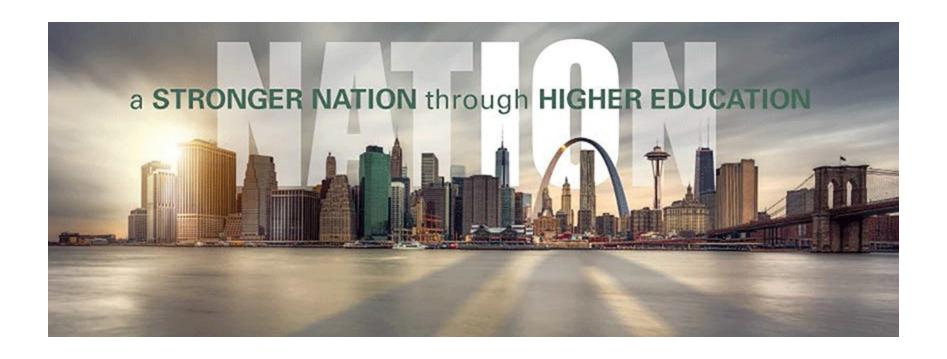

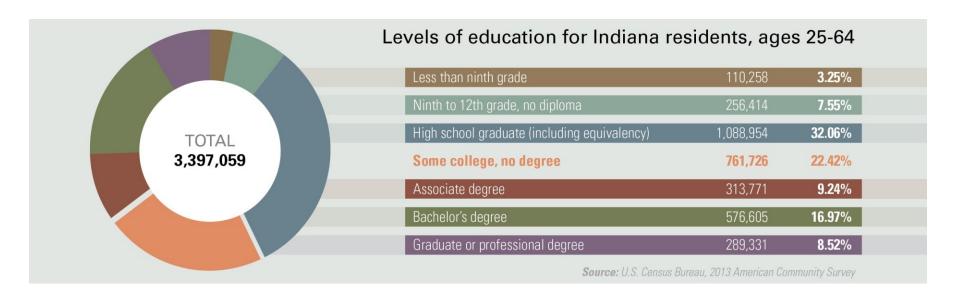

REALITY CHECK: Latino Student Success

So, in 2050, **30% of the U.S. population** is projected to be Latino.

Currently, **19%** of U.S. Latinos in have an Associate degree or higher. **13%** have a Bachelor's or higher.

REALITY CHECK: African American Student Success

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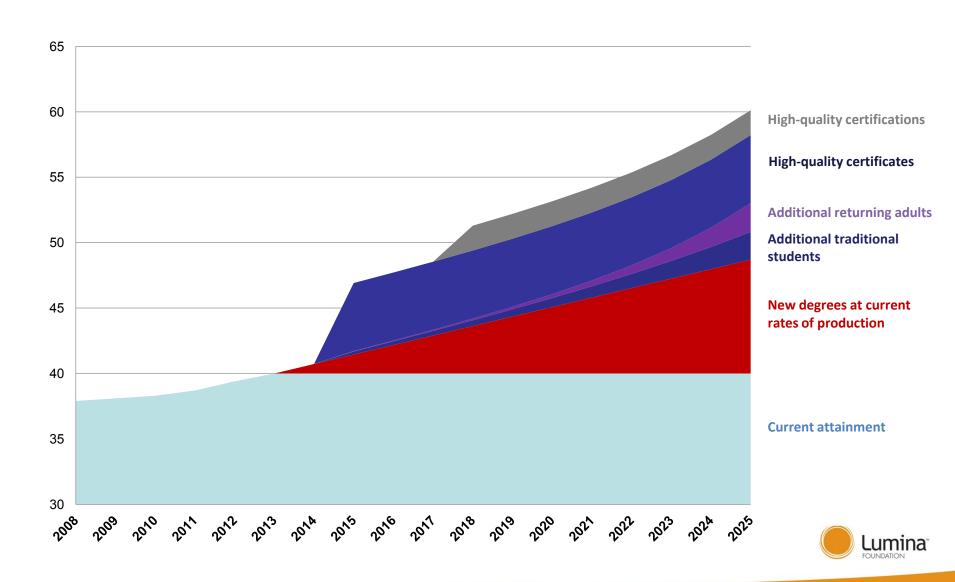
What about Johnson County?

- 3.4% Latino/Hispanic
- 1.7% Black/African American
 - Johnson had second most rapid rate of growth of African American population in the state (2010-13).
 - 10.3% of Indiana's 18-and-under population is Hispanic (vs. 5.8% 18-and-over).

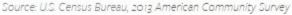


Roadmap for Reaching Goal 2025
