## **Classroom News:**

<u>Mrs. Reece – 6<sup>th</sup> LA -</u> We have now covered all six different text structures and will take a quiz over the material on Wednesday! As we prepare for ISTEP, we will be reviewing all of the grammar, reading, and writing skills that we have covered so far this year.

<u>Mrs. Reister – 6<sup>th</sup> Social Studies – This week students have been working on their Renaissance Biography</u> "Social Media" Poster. Next week will be a busy week! Students will present posters, round one of ISTEP begins, and we will begin focusing on the achievements of Ancient Greece! Eat breakfast and get plenty of rest!!

Mrs. Persinger – 6<sup>th</sup> Art - We have so much going on in the Art Room this week! Everyone will be painting their clay self-portraits to finish the clay unit project. We will also be wrapping up the Name Sculptures, which is an example of sculpture in the round, and then begin our exploration into relief sculpture by creating a 3 dimensional underwater scene. Our final sketchbook assignment is due on Friday, March 2<sup>nd</sup>!

<u>Mrs. Fields – 6<sup>th</sup> Math – ISTEP</u> begins next week! Please encourage your child to do their best, get plenty of rest and to eat a healthy breakfast each morning we are testing!! It is our time to shine and show what we know!! **Period 2** - We continued to get each class started with a constructed response question. We also took a look at inequalities this week and discovered they have multiple solutions. We spent time solving for

the variable and graphing the solution set. **Period 4, 5, 6** – We continued to get each class started with a constructed response question. We also spent time discovering about integers and how they are used in the real world. We ended the week talking about absolute value.

<u>Mrs. Dannaker – 6<sup>th</sup> Science - Chapter 8 Test coming up midweek.</u> Use your books and notes to study. Extra credit due Monday.

<u>Miss Severance – 7<sup>th</sup> Language Arts –</u> This week, students worked on doing their prompt attacks/prewriting plans for speed. They need to be able to plan an essay quickly in order to have more time for the actual writing of the essays. In addition, we continued to discuss different aspects of nonfiction. Students have a nonfiction unit test on Tuesday of next week. Book report information went out to HALA students on Thursday, and all other students will receive their book report guidelines at the end of next week. Book reports are due April 3 (the Tuesday after spring break), but students are continually encouraged to get them completed by March 23 so they don't have to work on them over break. <u>Mr. Bruns – 7<sup>th</sup> Social Studies – This week we have moved on to the second of the five major regions of Africa, East Africa. This is a very diverse region home to a variety of people and animals. We have also been taking some time out to learn about some influential African Americans throughout the history of our country, most notably Jesse Owens and Martin Luther King Jr. Next up on our journey through the African continent is the region of Southern Africa!</u>

Mrs. Beiser - 7th Science - The students are learning theories about how the solar system and Earth were born along with the evolution of life on Earth in the next few weeks. I know these can be delicate topics, and there are lots of emotions tied into the discussion of these theories. I addressed all my classes by telling them that theories are not fact but based on scientific evidence gathered and concluded by scientists. Part of learning science is just knowing the information available or being studied along with the terminology embedded within the theory. In no shape or form are these topics being taught to change religious views or family values. The theories are being taught because they are the most widely accepted in the fields of Earth and Space Science. My opinions are not shared at all while I introduce these topics. Students are welcome to share their views as long as they present them maturely and respectfully. Another part of learning, is to be able to understand the other views people have on the topic. Being able to understand the other views helps students to be more educated and have a deeper knowledge of the subject as well as a bigger perspective of people that do not share their beliefs. These next few weeks are to educate about topics in science that are studied and changing often. Tell your student to keep on task during class and use time wisely as many labs and homework assignments will be given. It is important to study notes and concepts at home or during study hall. Becoming more responsible for your own work is the goal during the last months of seventh grade. Bring everything everyday (BEE)!

<u>Mrs. Graham - 7th & 8th Math - We</u> are just days away from the first round of ISTEP! Students have been working through some constructed response practice problems. All students have done an excellent job of persevering through these challenging problems! Students have been focusing on organizing their work, showing ALL steps even the most basic ones, and, of course, reviewing math skills. I am very pleased with their attention to these problems! <u>PLEASE MAKE SURE YOUR STUDENT HAS A SCIENTIFIC CALCULATOR FOR TESTING NEXT THURSDAY!</u>

In addition to these constructed response problems, all students have been working with linear relationships. The 7th graders are working with proportional relationships, while the 8th graders are working with linear relationships of the format y=mx+b. The 8th grade class has also been working with the Pythagorean Theorem. Next week will be much the same as this week in the skills covered and practiced.

Mr. Gulley - 7th PE/Health - Finish Lesson 4, worksheets and Chapter 10 Test

<u>Mrs. Harvey – 8<sup>th</sup> Business –</u> Job shadow permission slips were due Friday, Feb. 23<sup>rd</sup>. We will continue exploring college and career topics next week.

<u>Mr. Whalbring – 8<sup>th</sup> Language Arts –</u> In eighth grade language arts, we are continuing our study of poetry, careful analysis of each text, which will help us get into the ISTEP spirit. Students also are working on presentations on a particular poet and poem of their choice, which they'll present to the class this Friday.

<u>Ms. Estep – 8<sup>th</sup> Math – 8<sup>th</sup> Grade Math- Students have been representing relationships between two sets of data on scatter plots.</u>

Algebra- Students finished the properties of exponents and are now classifying, adding, subtracting, multiplying, and dividing polynomials.

Mr. Gutzwiller – 8<sup>th</sup> Social Studies – We had another busy week in class! We wrapped up unit six with a test on Tuesday. Now, we will turn our attention to the West. It will involve traveling the Santa Fe, Oregon, and Mormon Trails along with bracing for a long war with Mexico! Students will also begin to understand the concept of "Manifest Destiny" in U.S. history. Students visited the Whitewater Technical Career Center on Thursday. Hopefully, this experience will give students some clarity in the direction they want to pursue in high school. Friday, March 9th is our "College for A Day" visit!

<u>Mrs. Crumley – 8<sup>th</sup> Science –</u> Students have entered the world of DNA. We will be doing DNA protein synthesis next week and wrap up chapter 11.

<u>Mrs. Allbright - Choir</u> – Choir and Band have started the Butter Braid Fundraiser. Money was due February 20th to the UC Choir Boosters when the order was placed. Pickup will be March 13<sup>th</sup> and these items are frozen so they must be picked up and taken straight home and put in the freezer.
