2. Be sure to use a separate device than the one you're recording with to play a track for your audition. Please frame your

Performance times are Thursday, Friday & Saturday @ 7pm, Sunday @ 2pm. There will be a 2pm performance on May 15th. Call time is one hour before performance unless otherwise arranged.

# TIPS FOR A SUCCESSFUL AUDITION

Auditioning, by nature, is a subjective experience. However, the auditionee should remember that the production staff is making a technical assessment, as opposed to a personal one. We are always thinking of the 'big picture' and will assess each candidate equally based on look, sound and how that person might fit into the production as a whole. We hope the following pointers will help you have the best audition experience possible.

- **BE YOURSELF!** It is important to note that, even though it may be paradox to the essence of theatre, it is impossible to be something you're not. We always want to see the 'real you' this will, no doubt, help you to shine and give us a clear picture of you, the actor.
- **BE LOUD!** Clarity & Quality of vocal sound are paramount to any performance. You may be the best actor ever, but if we can't hear or understand you, you might as well pack it in and hit the road! Be sure to be very conscious of your vocal production and how you infuse your 'volume' with the appropriate emotional quality for the role you are auditioning for.
- **FIND YOUR FOCAL POINT!** When auditioning (singing or reading) in a smaller room, it is customary to place your focus above and behind the people you are auditioning for. Beware of looking at those behind the table it tends to make us uncomfortable as we are not actually part of any given scene or song you may be performing.
- DRESS APPROPRIATELY! Wear clothing that helps you to feel attractive, comfortable and confident. Try to keep it simple! If there is to be a movement audition, bring a change of clothes or be ready to dance in what you are wearing. Remember that clothing can also suggest character. If you feel so inclined, you may want to consider wearing something appropriate to the role you are reading for but, try not to go overboard!
- SIDES! "Sides" is the term given to an excerpted bit of a scene, monologue or song from the actual show that you may be asked to read/sing from in an audition. If you are given a side, be sure to read through it very carefully so that you can perform your 'cold reading' well.
- MAKE CLEAR CHOICES! In all of your audition pieces, be sure to make strong, clear choices about things like tone of voice, emotional quality, rate of speech, intention/motivation in the scene or song and the five w's: where, when, why, what and to whom. Understanding these elements will help you relay the character you are portraying and give us a clear idea of your ability.
- DO YOUR RESEARCH! To give the best audition possible it is advisable to do some preliminary research so you know what it is your getting yourself into! Perhaps the most important part of this research, as it relates to musicals, is to have an appropriate song (or two!) to perform. In general, we prefer to hear uptempo material (as opposed to ballads) and songs from the musical theatre canon are best. Although, there are cases where pop songs or some other genre might be just right, it is usually best to go with a show-tune. - TAKE YOUR TIME, TAKE YOUR TIME, TAKE <u>YOUR</u> TIME! Being prepared and being relaxed is the best thing you can do to ensure a good and successful. Remember, we want you to succeed! Following these few suggestions may just help land you that big role! BREAK-A-LEG!

**SHUG AVERY** (Mezzo Belter) Range: E3 to E flat 5. Strong blues belter with confident head voice. Suggested audition: 16-32 bars of "Push Da Button"

**SOFIA** (Mezzo Belter) Range: E3 to B4. Tessitura sits low. Needs a good "growl" in her voice.

Suggested audition: 16-32 bars of "Hell No"

**NETTIE** (Mezzo Soprano) Range: F3 to E5. Solid vocalist with wide range including confident head voice.

HARPO (High Baritone) Needs solid G4 (G above middle C) with falsetto range to B4

ALBERT (MISTER) (High Baritone) Needs a solid A flat 4 (AL above middle C).

**SQUEAK** (Mezzo Soprano) Affected "squeaky" voice. Top sustained note – E flat 5.

**CHURCH LADIES** – Doris, Jarene, Darlene – Busybody types that function as a Greek Chorus, of sorts. Need to be strong singers with very good ears for picking up tight harmonies.

CHURCH SOLOIST (Dynamic Mezzo)

**ENSEMBLE**: Males and females, 20s – 50s, African-American. All types and singing ranges. Need fantastic singing voices and dynamic personalities. To play various roles in the ensemble, including: Pa (Celie & Nettie's father), Preacher, Grady, Buster, Adam, Olivia, Ol' Mister
