Another key development this past year involved the decision by Hall Render, our longtime lobbying and governmental affairs partner, to discontinue its lobbying division. Consequently, we contracted with John Hammond and Kip Tew from Ice Miller for the 2017 legislative session and were very well represented. Unfortunately, one of our key priorities was a proposed increase in the tobacco tax and an accompanying increase in funding for tobacco prevention and cessation programs, neither of which made it into the final biennial budget. With a new governor, however, we have been very pleased by the collaborative tone that seems to have been struck between the Executive and Legislative branches of our state government, particularly as it relates to issues of importance to the IAFP and family medicine.
