

For eighteen years, Franklin College has partnered with local non-profit agencies through a course, Statistical Consulting Project, in which teams of senior and junior mathematics majors and minors, as well as some sociology majors and economics majors, perform semester-long consulting projects at no cost.

Recent clients include Johnson County Community Foundation, Assist, and a consortium of education foundations, and government agencies such as the Johnson County Alternative Dispute Resolution project, Johnson County Probation Department, and the Town of New Whiteland.
