Executive Director's Message



The Representative Assembly (RA) met a Ben Davis High School this year with around 220 members present. The staff and administration at Wayne Township were tremendous hosts for our meeting. My message to the RA follows:

Your Indiana Retired Teachers Association has had a very good year. We are on track to be in the black on a budget that was lower than our 2012 budget year. This makes 5 years in a row of living

within our means and the third with a lower budget. Membership is up in both regular and associate members. The IRTA website continues to evolve as it offers updated information, educational materials and benefits to our members. Our website is an essential and effective tool to reach out to present and future members.

Your board is committed to keeping IRTA relevant and important for retired and active educators in the future. Our complete updating of policies and bylaws is almost finished. This will allow us to operate more efficiently with coordinated policies and bylaws. Our new committee structure is evolving to meet today's needs of the IRTA.

With the Supplemental Accounts established, the legislature will be able to prefund these accounts to establish potential increases in pension benefits. These accounts will not have enough funding until at least 2020 to begin to a COLA and an increased 13th Check for 2019 and possible 2020.

IRTA needs to stay very involved in the legislature and advocating for retired educators. Most pension legislation today targets future educators and their pensions and well-being. We will continue to monitor changes to pensions and benefits that could affect today's retiree or our future retiree's.

IRTA continues to look for cost reductions as we shopped for a new dental insurance plan for the staff. It went into effect on January 1 and will save the IRTA about 40% from previous plan and provide more coverage to our staff. The board has capped the insurance package premiums and the percentage they will pay for employee's 401k plans that will control costs in the future. Next year's budget shows an increase for the first time in couple of years, but is only \$8,000 dollars more than our 2015-16 budget, less than a one percent increase.

IRTA continues to work with AMBA for more member benefits and insurances. We will soon be able to offer a two tier Dental package. The first tier will be what we offer now, the second will cost less, but pay less percentages on dental work done. AMBA is working with Ameritas to increase their dental network so more members will benefit from being in-network with their dentist. You may ask your dentist to become part of the Ameritas network.

Our regular membership showed an increase for the first time in two years with 172 more. Our associate memberships are up for the third year in a row with an increase of 265 members. Many locals showed membership gains and Rushville once again led the way with having a state membership rate of 85% of potential members.

This year IRTA/AMBA will offer a generous incentive package for member recruitment that will be introduced soon. Membership is everyone's responsibility and the best way to get new members is to reach out and make personal contacts. Let potential members know of the increase of benefits and savings by being an IRTA member. IRTA advocacy for pensions, educational resources and materials will continue to grow and support members in their retirement. This the best time to be an IRTA member. Please make it a personal mission and goal to recruit your former colleagues to IRTA. You will be helping the association and yourself by not having to cut services or increase dues.

We are excited about the School Bell Award and Contest that AMBA is sponsoring for our recruitment efforts. Details of the membership contest is featured later in this newsletter. The IRTF continues to support future educators, active teachers, and retired teachers in need with their three-prong approach. The IRTF board has been discussing the possibility of establishing an endowment for the foundation that will allow for self-funding of the established scholarship and grant programs. They are hoping to make a big announcement this fall and kick off a fundraiser for the endowment.

A donation to IRTF is tax deductible, so please seriously consider making a yearly donation to IRTF, bequeathing the foundation, or making the foundation part of your required minimum distribution disbursement each year. The IRTF potential is only limited by the amount of donations it receives each year.

The IRTF raised \$2100 at its silent auction at the RA and we appreciate everyone who donated baskets, quilts, and other prizes on behalf of the Foundation.

Our Associate Membership dues will increase on July 1, 2018. A one year associate membership will now cost \$15, a 3 year membership will be \$40, and a 5 year membership is \$65. The dues structure now mirrors our regular membership plans, offering a 1, 3 and 5 year memberships. It was costing us more than we were taking in with our associate dues. This increase was approved at the RA.

As soon as we receive the revised and corrected Bylaws they will be posted on our website. We cannot thank our Bylaw Committee enough for taking on this three year project to revise and rewrite all of our bylaws since 1972.

Congratulations to all of our award winners and our Clock Award winners that are featured in this publication.

Thank you for being a proud IRTA member, supporting IRTA and being a grassroots advocate for our association. You are what makes IRTA great.
