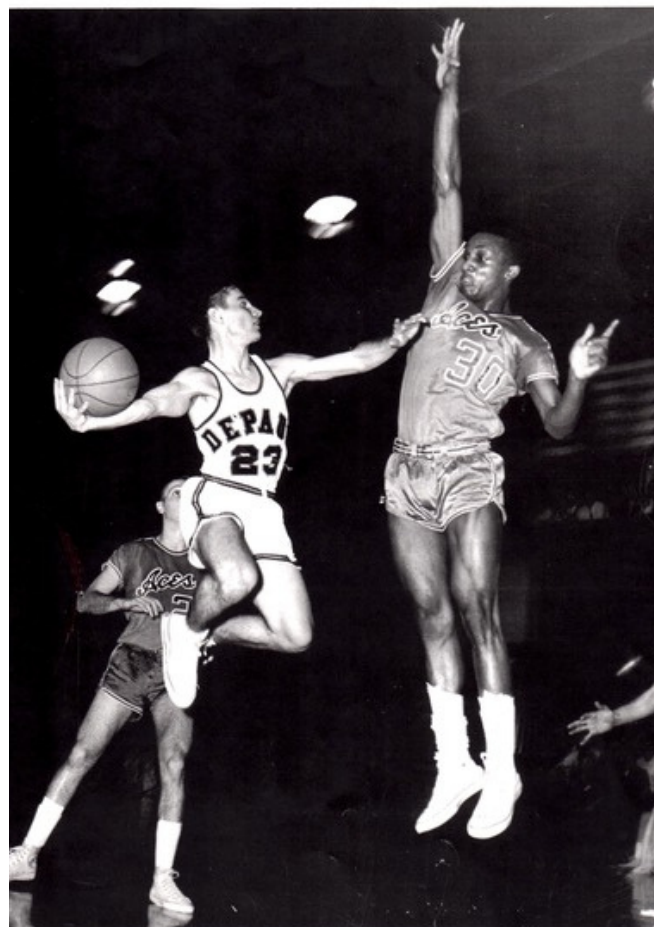

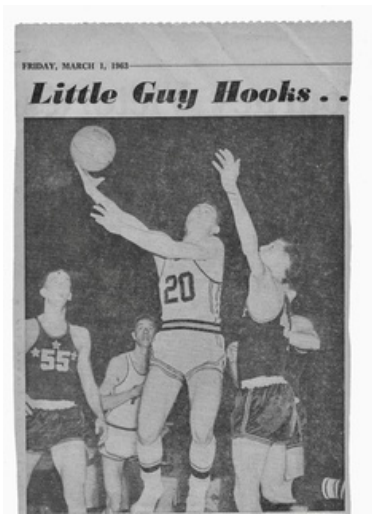

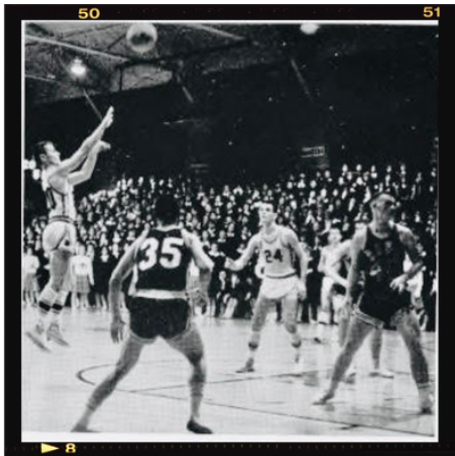

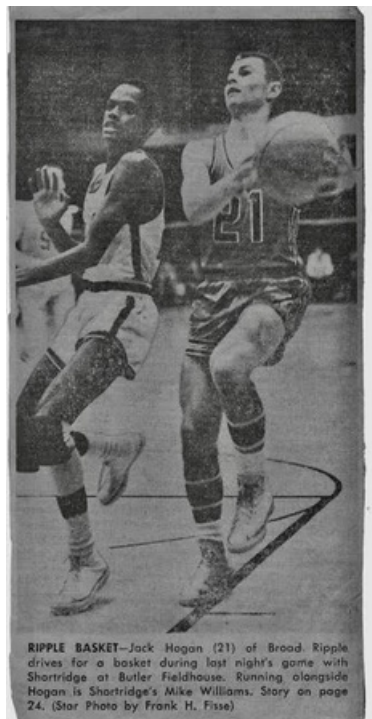


Hogan Jump Shot vs. Howe

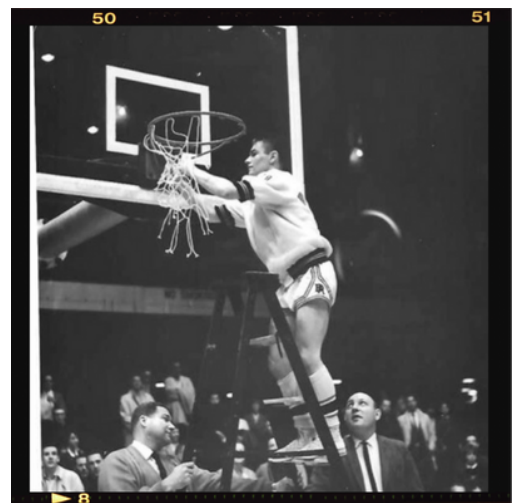


Coach Gene Ring Awarding Net to Hogan. 1963 Sectional-Regional.

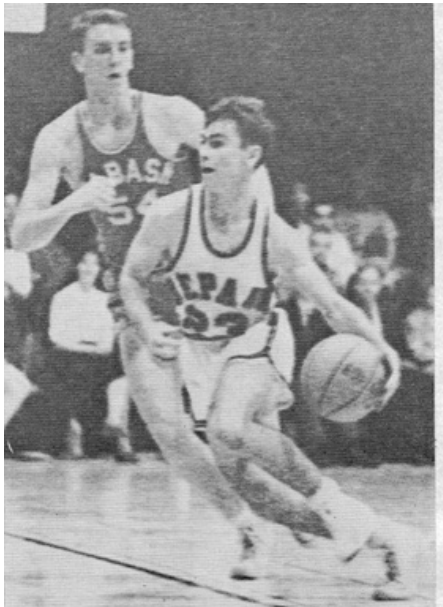
Hogan Cutting Down Sectional Net

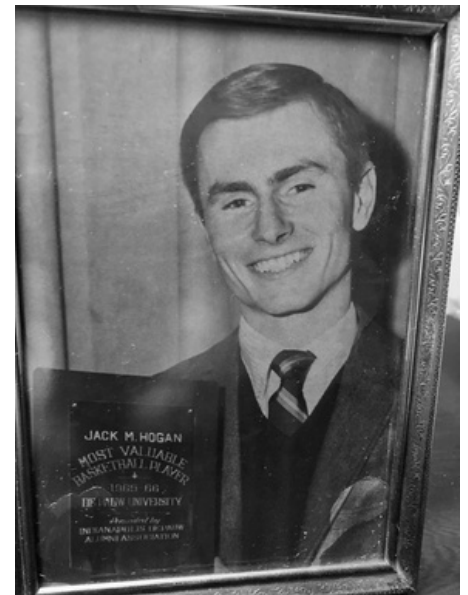

Little Hogan Big Trouble—For Foes

Greencastle, Ind. — Jack Hogan walks small, thinks tall and can fire a basketball ho-witzer with the best of them.

The diminutive (5 feet, 6 inches) DePaul University shooting specialist is billed as the smallest college starter in the nation. In the absence of any definite proof, suffice it to say he is the tiniest Indiana Collegiate Conference regular of them all.

BUT ELMER McCALL still will take him—and start him — because the mighty mite from Indianapolis Broad Ripple is a basketball player, despite his height, or lack of it.

"Everyone we play tell us he's the best player for his size in the game," says McCall, "and I think he is. He's sorta fabulous. He gets more out of what he's got than you've any right to expect."

As for Hogan himself, he tries to forget about his small stature and concentrate on the game.

"When we're playing away from home, I get a lot of razzing from the crowd," he says with a shy grin. "But the other players don't say much about it. And it helps with other guard (Dan Schermer) being only 5-4."

For such a little guy, Hogan "casts" surprisingly few shots —only three in last season's sophomore year and four for the Tigers' first 13 games.

"You have to learn when to shoot the ball," he says. "I haven't tried to put any higher arch in it since my high school days, but I might shoot only four or five times in one game and 20 in another."

DEFENSE, of course, is the big problem for a little man. Most teams would lick their chops over the prospect of

playing a 5-6 guard and lead him in and out of the hole all evening to get a mismatch in size.

"We have some special stuff in our defense to counteract this," Hogan grins. "But when I'm caught, I try to anticipate which way the guy is going to turn when he gets the ball and try to get a stab at it. This works about 50 per cent of the time. But if I miss, they've got a sure field goal."

"I haven't grown since graduating from Broad Ripple. I grew 2 inches between my junior and senior years there and I actually get up to 5-6 now only with my shoes on; otherwise I keep measuring myself at 5-5½."

"And I wasn't sure I could make it in basketball at DePaul. I played baseball at Ripple so when I went out for basketball here, I didn't think I could make the team but figured I could still fall back on baseball."

"But when I made it last year, I 'retired' from baseball, evening to get a mismatch in size."

"I really like to play. My biggest game had to be last season when I had 28 points and we beat Butler at their place."

As far as Evansville's towering Aces are concerned, last Wednesday was another banner night for the little guy.

HE SCORED 22 points in DePaul's 95-93 loss — with eight of his fielders coming in the final half and driving his defensive man, 6-3 Sam Watkins, almost out of his mind with daring moves and quick shots.

Not including last night's game at Butler, Hogan has averaged 12.8 points a game, third high on a ball club that has an 82-point offensive average. He's also taken down 29 rebounds, a 2.8 average that makes his grin even wider.

IT SEEMS like no matter how high I jump, someone's always there to take the ball out of my hands," he says. "Sometimes I go three or four games without a rebound. But when you don't expect to get them, it doesn't bother you too much."

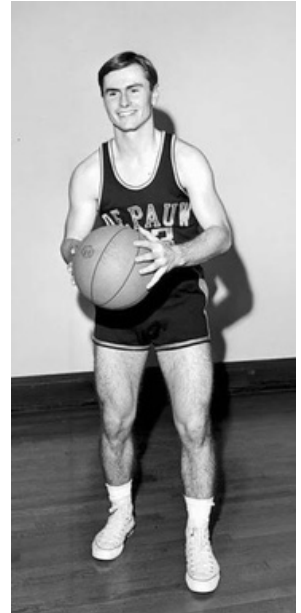
Evansville Falls To Tiger Comeback
