






GRANT MOFFITT KANSAS STATE '26

In honor of the 15th anniversary of the Global Service Initiative, the *Delta Upsilon Quarterly* team sat down with Grant Moffitt, Kansas State '26, during the May 2025 GSI trip in Negril, Jamaica, to learn more about his experience with the program.



Could you tell us a little bit about what you have been doing today?

We finished digging a hole and building half of the wall (that will line the driveway). We continue to put mortar on concrete.

What has been your experience working with brothers from other chapters?

Everybody's super welcoming, super outgoing. It's kind of interesting to find that we're so alike, even though we're so far geographically. It's a lot of guys with shared ideals, shared values. That's what unites us, and it really shows through on trips like this.

Which of the Four Founding Principles do you think most closely relates to the work you're doing here?

The Advancement of Justice is definitely the Principle that I've seen the most. Normally, we think of that in kind of a more serious way, as in correcting or trying to help brothers with problems. But I think it's also bringing those up who aren't as fortunate. We talk about equality and equity a lot, and it may be equal that everybody's going to school across our nations, but the schools may not be equitable, and that's what we're here to do. The Advancement of Justice is helping those that have not been as fortunate as us, and we're trying to better that.

How has this trip changed you as a person?

I haven't really been outside of the United States my whole life, but this trip has changed me in that I really got to see how the people in Jamaica go about their day-to-day lives. Some of the privileges that we have in the U.S., they don't have here. It's helped me to take that further step to become a global citizen, to be aware of the problems throughout the world, and not just get so caught up in my day-to-day life that I'm ignoring the trials and tribulations of others.

What would you say to someone considering going on a GSI trip?

Anybody who is considering going on GSI, take the jump. There's really no loss. I've loved being out here. It's been amazing. All the work here, it's tough, but you see what you're doing, and you see the effect that it has on the local community. You see the smiles on the kids' faces when we walk in, when we bring them books and other donations, and then how happy these citizens are here. The people at Higher Heights know that we're bettering their school and not just another tourist.

WHAT IS GSI?

Since 2011, DU and GSI have taken students to Jamaica for service immersion trips where they are engaged in direct, hands-on service. Each day of the seven-day trip includes a reflection designed to help participants explore how they have been impacted and influenced by the experience, as well as how their work relates to each of DU's Principles. Much of the work has been with Jamaican schools on construction, renovation and beautification projects.

To help fund the GSI experience, each DU chapter is asked to raise money for the program. Philanthropy events, such as pancake dinners, car shows, bowl-athons, haunted houses and more, raise money for various GSI expenses. These expenses include building materials, cement, lumber and tools, as well as pay for local laborers.

Over time, GSI has also grown to include Regional GSI events that bring the program's curriculum closer to home. On these domestic service projects, nearby chapters partner together to address a community need and reflect on the experience. Regional GSI activities are typically one-day experiences, though the Fraternity has held multi-day experiences in New Orleans, Atlanta, and Washington, D.C.

HISTORY OF GSI

In 2009, the Fraternity's International President, Dr. Bernard Franklin, *Kansas State* '75, convened a President's Task Force with the mission of exploring the relevance of the social fraternity on the 21st century college campus and in an emerging global economy.

Around this same time, DU Executive Director Justin Kirk, Boise State '00, traveled to Jamaica for a friend's wedding and was introduced to Kaye Schendel, the Assistant Director of University Centers at the University of Wisconsin-La Crosse, who was on the island coordinating an Alternative Spring Break trip for UWL students. Schendel was an advocate for providing students with an experience that would take them beyond an all-inclusive party vacation and better show them the culture and pride of the country. Then Fraternity Board member John Duncan, Oregon State '00, and staff member Andy Bergman, were also at this wedding, and as the group continued to talk, someone wondered aloud why such an experience couldn't be replicated for members of a national fraternity. Here, the idea for GSI was born.

Understanding that such a service-immersion experience connected with the goal of the President's Task Force, in summer 2009, the Fraternity's Board of Directors gave the initiative unanimous support, and a pilot trip was planned for May 2010. During that May trip, eight students joined Schendel, Kirk, Duncan and Bergman for a week of service and intentional conversations around global issues and the importance of serving others. This pilot trip was a catalyst for developing a multi-year strategy for the future of the Global Service Initiative, which became Delta Upsilon's official international service project and philanthropy in 2011.

Schendel went on to join the DU staff as Director of Global Initiatives and retired in 2020. She still serves as a consultant for DU and attends most GSI trips to Jamaica.

HIGHER HEIGHTS ACADEMY

Over the past 15 years, Delta Upsilon and the GSI have worked with a number of schools and youth organizations in Jamaica, primarily on construction, renovation and beautification projects. Thanks to connections DU and Schendel have developed over time with Jamaica's Ministry of Education and Youth, the Fraternity is put in contact with schools needing assistance. In 2017, DU was connected with Higher Heights Academy in Savanna-la-Mar, Jamaica, and continues to work with the school to this day.

At the time DU began working with Higher Heights, the school's principal, Miss Kerene, had just one room, a small group of students and a dream. Early childhood education is hard to access in Jamaica, and she wanted to provide a safe, educational experience for children in her community. With DU's help, today, Higher Heights Academy is now certified by the Jamaican Early Childhood Commission and has eight classrooms and a playground for its 130+ students.

Delta Upsilon has worked on a number of projects for Higher Heights including building classrooms, constructing a playground, roof repairs, fence building, driveway pavement and more.



DELTA UPSILON'S 163RD CHAPTER

On March 2, 2025, Delta Upsilon welcomed the 163rd chapter in its 190-year history as the Tampa Chapter was officially installed. The event was held at the Crescent Club in the campus Vaughn Center with nearly 65 in attendance to witness the Installation Ceremony and Initiation of 48 chartering members.

The Tampa Chapter's journey began in spring 2023 as the Fraternity began expansion recruitment efforts on campus. DU Leadership Consultants were at the University of Tampa throughout the spring to host public relations and recruitment events and set the new group up for success. The Associate Chapter Ceremony was held on April 23, 2023, with 17 associate members.

Over the course of the next two years, the associate chapter worked to build a name for itself on campus and meet the Fraternity's requirements for Installation. This included recruiting more members and other benchmarks for chapter operations. Areas the chapter specifically focused on were service and philanthropy.

During its time as an associate chapter, the brothers established strong relationships with both Meals on Wheels and the Humane Society—the only organization on campus to do so. After Hurricane Helene (September 2024) and Hurricane Milton (October 2024), the associate chapter served both organizations with their humanitarian aid efforts. The associate chapter also created a signature philanthropy event, a flag football tournament.

"My vision is for the Tampa Chapter to be a leading example of what a modern fraternity can look like—a chapter that is values-driven, inclusive, service-oriented,

and deeply respected on campus and nationally," said Chapter President Beckham Hughes, *Tampa* '26. "I see us expanding our impact through mentorship, professional development, and stronger alumni relations."

Thanks to a DU Educational Foundation Board of Trustees Meeting happening in Naples, Florida, the same weekend as the chapter's Installation Ceremony, several high-profile DU volunteers were on hand to help charter the Tampa Chapter and initiate its members. The Ritual Team consisted of DU Executive Director Justin Kirk, Boise State '00, as Master; Fraternity Secretary Aaron Clevenger, Central Florida '97, as Examiner; Chapter Advisor Nick Thommen, Bradley' 11, as Chief Marshal; and DU Director of Chapter Development Matthew Panzano, Florida '12, as Chaplain. International Fraternity President Tom Durein, Oregon State '92, delivered The Charge Address. Several members of DU's Embry-Riddle Chapter were also in attendance.

Following the Installation Ceremony, Brother Hughes had this to say of his chapter's accomplishment: "Being a founding member of this chapter has been one of the most meaningful leadership experiences of my life. I'm proud of what we've built, and I am excited to see how future brothers continue to grow and evolve our legacy. Even though we are a newer chapter, our members are unified by a shared purpose to uphold the Fraternity's Four Founding Principles and create a legacy of excellence at the University of Tampa."

CALIFORNIA STATE UNIVERSITY, FULLERTON

Fullerton, California NEW EXPANSION!

Delta Upsilon will begin expansion recruitment efforts at California State University, Fullerton during the 2025-2026 academic year. This will mark the first time Delta Upsilon has had a presence on campus.

Cal State Fullerton has an undergraduate enrollment of more than 38,000, and DU will join four other fraternities as part of the campus IFC. The Multicultural Greek Council has eight groups, the National Pan-Hellenic Council has two groups, and the Panhellenic Council has six sororities.

CARNEGIE MELLON UNIVERSITY

Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania Original Charter Date: Dec. 15, 1917

Kent, Ohio

Original Charter Date: Dec. 4, 1948

Delta Upsilon began expansion efforts to restart the Kent State Chapter in spring 2025 with a number of virtual recruitment events, as well as in-person events. The chapter originally chartered in 1948 but has been closed since 2022.

DU Leadership Consultants will be on campus throughout the fall 2025 term to recruit more new members, work with alumni, recruit and train advisors, and set the group toward Associate Chapter Ceremony requirements.

UNIVERSITY OF NORTH CAROLINA WILMINGTON

Wilmington, North Carolina Original Charter Date: Feb. 2, 1974

Delta Upsilon is excited to return to the University of North Carolina Wilmington during the 2025-2026 academic year. The Wilmington Chapter first opened in 1974 but was closed just three years later in 1977.

The undergraduate enrollment at UNC Wilmington is just over 14,000. DU will join 14 other IFC fraternities currently on campus. In addition to DU, two other fraternities are scheduled to expand on campus in the next three years (in fall 2026 and fall 2027 respectively). The campus also has 11 Panhellenic Council sororities, five National Pan-Hellenic Council groups, and two United Greek Council groups.

They also had the opportunity to take part in a Regional GSI service project with the Florida Chapter where the men assisted the Repurpose Project in Gainesville. The chapter thanks Owen Dover, Embry-Riddle '27, who was responsible for making these service opportunities possible. The chapter is also proud to have won first place in Theta Phi Alpha's Cutie Pie competition and first place for fraternities during the Greek Weekend Competitions.

Brother Ryan Bailey, Embry-Riddle '27, was elected as Team Lead for the school's Design-Build-Fly club team. Nicholas Albrittton, Embry-Riddle '27, received the Crosby Army ROTC scholarship and was admitted to Air Assault School.







FLORIDA

On March 8, the Florida Chapter participated in the university's The Big Event, an annual gathering of campus organizations to perform service in the Gainesville community. This year, the chapter was assigned to prepare decorations for Stop Children's Cancer, a local nonprofit business donating money to children's hospitals. The brothers had a lot of fun building boxes, folding napkins, and spending time with the manager for Stop Children's Cancer.

This semester, the chapter introduced "Cooking with Carlos," a member education event that employs Carlos, the house dad, to help instruct and educate the chapter on all matter related to cooking. On April 17, Carlos taught the chapter how to grill pizzas.

GEORGIA TECH

The Georgia Tech Chapter hosted an Atlanta Braves watch party during the opening series of the season. Alumni of all ages came to the event to cheer on the Braves and impart their wisdom on the undergraduates. Nineteen new brothers were also initiated into the chapter this past year.

The brothers continue their work with Food 4 Lives, an organization that assists the unhoused in Atlanta. During Homecoming weekend, the chapter hosted a wiffleball tournament to raise money for Food 4 Lives, and in February, the DU brothers worked with Alpha Gamma Delta sisters on a day of service with the group.

ILLINOIS

Philanthropy was a priority for the Illinois Chapter this spring. To raise money for Alzheimer's Awareness, the chapter partnered with Panda Express on a giveback night with a portion of the restaurant's proceeds going toward the cause. The chapter was also proud to welcome two new members this spring.

IOWA STATE

During the Iowa State Chapter's spring DU Drive Through event, the brothers sold loaded fries and root beer floats to raise more than \$4,000 for the Global Service Initiative. The chapter leveraged local partnerships for this event, with root beer from 1919 Root Beer and fries donated by Culver's. This year, the chapter raised over \$10,000 for GSI—a first in the chapter's history.

With a "Harry Potter, the Greek who Lived" theme, the chapter and its Homecoming partners at Alpha Gamma Delta placed second in soccer and fourth place in football, while receiving the Best Crowd Interaction and Most Outstanding Main Character during the Lip Sync competition. In total, DU and AGD raised over \$30,000 for the Special Olympics of Iowa.

LOUISVILLE

The Louisville Chapter hosted an associate member retreat the Monday before

Initiation that included a Jeopardy night where each associate member was a captain of a team of initiated brothers and played a game of Jeopardy involving all things DU, such as local and national history, important figures, and dates. All six spring associate members attended, as well as the majority of initiated brothers.

MIAMI

The Miami Chapter and its brothers had an exciting year. Following a successful recruitment, the chapter welcomed 24 new brothers. The men also won the campus Greek Week and hosted its longstanding Puddle Pull competition. Three senior members on the Miami Club Hockey team made regionals, with one being named Most Valuable Player.

MISSOURI

This year, the Missouri Chapter hosted four service events with The Food Bank for Northeast and Central Missouri. During each event, brothers packed cans of food to be sent to people in need, as well as performed light cleaning around the facility. During the campus fraternity/ sorority life awards, the chapter received a Chapter of Excellence Award, the Excellence in Civic/Community Engagement Award, and Academic Achievement recognition. Alumnus and Past Delta Upsilon Fraternity President Bruce McKinney, Missouri '74, and his wife, Teresa, were presented with a 2025 Director's Award for Community Advocacy.

NEBRASKA

Philanthropy was important to the Nebraska Chapter this spring. The brothers hosted their annual DU Donuts event and raised more than \$3,500 for the Global Service Initiative. They also participated in the campus' Dance Marathon Fundraiser and helped raise more than \$111,000 for Children's Nebraska. The chapter was also proud to welcome five new members this spring.









PURDUE

The Purdue Chapter wants to make the DU experience possible for more men on campus. With a focus on recruitment, the chapter nearly tripled its size over the past year. More than 40 men were recruited in the fall, and another 24 in the spring. The chapter hosted recruitment events like BBQ and Blackjack, Poker and Panda, and mini golf for brothers and potential members. The chapter also understands that campus involvement plays a direct role in recruitment. The men have made it a priority to participate in and host campus events, including having a larger presence in the Purdue Grand Prix go-kart race.



OUINNIPIAC

The Quinnipiac Chapter took home several awards during the campus Fraternity/ Sorority Life Awards. Alex Han, Quinnipiac '26, received the Executive Officer of the Year Award for his work as VP Administration. Dylan Bonacic, Quinnipiac '27, received the New Member of the Year Award. David Roy, Quinnipiac '28, received the Fraternal Values Award, and the chapter received the Fraternal Collaboration Award. Will Ryan, Quinnipiac '26, was appointed as a member of the 2025 Cornerstone Class.

The chapter participated in a variety of service projects this spring, building new relationships with Haven's Harvest, a nonprofit food distribution/collection organization that works to collect food and other goods from restaurants and stores to distribute to those in need. Brothers also returned to YMCA Camp Sloper for the campus' Big Event for the third year in a row, setting up the camp's massive space for summer campers. Finally, for QTHON, the chapter paired with Kappa Delta to make homemade pillows for the children in the Connecticut Children's Hospitals.

TENNESSEE

The Tennessee Chapter has focused on building brotherhood this year. The brothers held an exciting formal at the top of the Sunsphere in Knoxville and hosted several social events with other groups on campus. To further connect brothers to DU's Principles, the chapter has installed a Chaplain position that has focused on Fraternity songs on traditions.

The chapter is proud of Brother Caleb Massengill, Tennessee '26, for his election as President of Order of Omega and Austin Koehler, Tennessee '26, on his initiation into the honors society.



WESTERN ILLINOIS

Philanthropy continues to be a cornerstone of the Western Illinois Chapter's operations.

In March, the chapter's annual Delta Hoopsilon 3-on-3 basketball tournament raised more than \$2,000 for local charities and the Global Service Initiative. This event and an accompanying 50/50 resulted in \$818 given to the Salvation Army and raffle winner Bob Moore giving his money to St. Paul's Catholic Church.

President's Club Donors RIVE THE ANNUAL LOYA

Delta Upsilon's Annual Loyalty Fund is supported by donations of all sizes, and each year, donors are recognized with membership in various Annual Giving Clubs based on their giving level. The goal of these Giving Clubs is to recognize donors and encourage them to aspire for membership in higher Annual Giving Clubs in the future.

Today, the DUEF features 14 Annual Giving Clubs, and the President's Club is the Foundation's oldest and foremost Club. Established in the early 1970s by then Fraternity President W. D. Watkins, North Carolina '27, the President's Club recognized those giving at least \$100 to the DUEF annually. Over time, the annual giving threshold of the President's Club increased to \$125 in 1992, then \$200 in 1998, and up to \$500 in 2014. Starting in the 2025-2026 fiscal year, the President's Club will be upgraded to recognize donors who give \$1,000 or more to the DUEF.

FROM THE Archives



Though Delta Upsilon was founded in 1834, it wasn't until the 1880s that the idea of a Fraternity central office was discussed. It was at the 1882 Convention in Ann Arbor, Michigan that the Convention asked that a headquarters officially be established in New York City.

This safe was purchased in 1882 to house important Fraternity documents at the Fraternity's first headquarters. When the headquarters moved to Indianapolis in 1969, the safe made the journey and continued to be used. The safe was officially "retired" in 2001—ending its 119-year career—when the International Headquarters building was renovated.

Today, it remains on display at IHQ in Indianapolis.
