Chi Chapter has one of, in our opinion, the strongest Alumni Relations services in the Fraternity. In addition to sending out 12 e-newsletters a year, one of which is attached for the 400 level, we make sure that we have the largest reach for those newsletters. We have valid email addresses for 85% of living alumni, and valid physical addresses for 96% of alumni. We also send out a physical newsletter twice yearly, and those are also attached for the 400 level.

In addition, we hosted three large alumni events in the 2019 calendar year.

The first event we hosted was the Byron J. Horn Memorial Panel, in which we had several younger alumni come speak on their experience in the professional world in their first decade removed from College. At that panel we had Daniel Glazer, Dan Rooker, Michael Marting, Jake Thorn and Alex O'Connor speak.

We also host an annual May open house after the school year ends where brothers who are on campus for their respective class reunions can get together.

Over homecoming weekend of this year, we hosted a large reunion spanning several generations of Chi alumni for the Doc Burns Memorial held at the Delt Lodge. Robert "Doc" Burns was the Chi faculty advisor for over 30 years and passed away in the Spring at the age of 90. We held an event that was heavily advertised and open to all alumni to celebrate his life and legacy in the chapter. As the event was so large, we did not take official attendance with names but over 30 alumni, and Delt CEO Jack Kreman were in attendance.

Follow Your North Star

Joe Grimes '82, offers sage advice to today's young Fraternity Men



I was a swimmer in high school and wanted to swim in college, so gravitated to swimmers automatically. I also was

taking some classes freshman year with Sophomores who were in the fraternity and they made it sound like a great organization. At decision day I had multiple bids, but in the end decided to go with the Deltas and have absolutely no regrets

Some of my best memories include the Delt formals, along with just kicking back in the Delt lounge watching football and other sports.

During my time as an undergrad, I was House and Ground Chairman. The fraternity was part of my Kenyon experience which overall prepared me for life after college. The fraternity allowed for the development of deep friendships; understanding different points of view; the value of teamwork; how to work through decisions with different brothers where our opinions were different; motivation; and influence; hard to get people to clean up detail the day after an event if they don't have a certain amount of belief and faith in your process and integrity. These have been core skills in my professional career as a senior leader in various companies and in my personal family life.

I think the Greek system is getting an unfair view by many people today. I found the Deltas a great organization to join and feel like I grew a lot personally from the experiences and, of course, the mistakes where my brothers were there to help me make sure they weren't too bad. Both my son and daughter were members of Greek organizations during their college years (neither at Kenyon) and they had similar feelings. However, the Greek system is now under a microscope more due to some extreme examples of hazing, sexual abuse, racism, bullying and other non-acceptable behaviors. I believe in general that these are the extremes vs. the norm.

All students want organizations where they feel they belong, are valued for and they themselves can feel a deep sense of connection and loyalty whether a fraternity, band, club or something else. The Greek system though is the most structured of all of these and extends across many universities, which is why it is much easier to condemn these organizations than individual organizations. At the same time given this position, we have a responsibility to exhibit and show a higher standard as leaders of organizations within our schools. The Greek system is an important part of growing up and even the pressures being brought to bear on it today is part of this education, how we react will show our leadership and our value to the institutions in which we have chapters. If we do it right, we will be wanted, respected and considered a key valuable piece of the college's experience, if we don't then we risk the college pushing us out.

I have spent more than 30 years in the financial services industry in multiple businesses, functions and leadership positions. I started at GE Capital and have worked at a variety of companies including a subsidiary of Dun & Bradstreet and have been at Fannie Mae as a VP since 2005. I received my MBA from Harvard Business School in 1988 and married my wife Jennifer, who I met at GE, two days after graduation. We have two children Joseph and Catherine both who are out of college (neither went to Kenyon). Joseph is working in New Jersey, and Catherine is finishing classes required for her to go to grad school. We moved to California in 1998, and have been here ever since living in Westlake Village outside of Los Angeles and about half-way to Santa Barbara.

For today's young men, have a very good sense of what is right and what is wrong in your mind. Lead your life on this aspect vs. just what the rules say - this is your North Star which should guide you whenever tough choices are presented to you. The North Star is important because even rules may be flawed and need to be challenged even more difficult when people are comfortable with them as the status quo. It is those that follow their North Star that challenge what exists today and force change that makes things better going forward. As members of a leadership organization your responsibility is even greater, make sure you treat it carefully and make sure that what you do make those around you proud to be your brother and friend, not ashamed to have ever know you.

Byron J. Horn Memorial Panel



The 2019 Byron J. Horn Memorial Alumni Panel was held last weekend in Gambier. Ten alumni from classes spanning 2012-2017 traveled from across the country to join us on campus for an afternoon of discussion and mentorship. Over twenty actives attended, nearly the entire chapter. Conference calls held in the months leading up to the panel revealed the chapter's strong interest in learning more about career paths in business and law. The panel was structured around those interests with principles that could also be applied more broadly.

On February 24, 2019, current alumni chair **Jake Barnett** moderated a discussion with four panelists, including **Daniel Glaser '13** (entrepreneurship), **Daniel Rooker '12** (financial planning), **Michael Marting '14** (investment banking), and **Jake Thorn '14** (law). They provided practical advice on topics including:

- Securing their first job out of Kenyon and the impact of DTD mentorship
- Leveraging modern networking with alumni and industry professionals
- Developing entry-level experience

through calculated risk-taking

- Making the decision to go directly to graduate school or to pursue experience beforehand
- Adjusting to life outside of Gambier

After a two-hour conversation guided by questions submitted ahead of time, the actives peppered the panelists with questions sparked by the discussion. Following the Q&A session, the panel dispersed into break-out groups tailored to various career interests. Post-panel feedback was overwhelmingly positive, and the alumni in attendance were invigorated to continue serving as mentors, both to the chapter as well as one another.

The recent alumni who returned to campus this weekend, including the panelists, were inspired by the efforts of leaders in Delt classes across the '80s. These leaders were first responsible for reconnecting with the chapter several years ago in honor of Bryon Horn.

Now, we seek to emulate our Brothers' dedication to lives of excellence as we ascend in our chosen industries as well. To that end, we plan to continue the panel and to maintain this tradition for years to come.

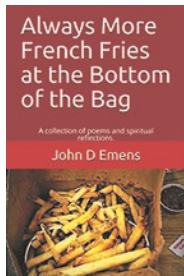

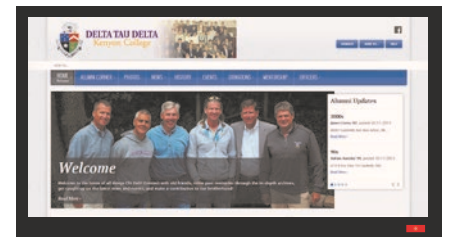
Annual Fund Totals

Brothers Where it Mattered Most

Jim Plunkett (Stanford University, 1970) was the runaway winner of the 1970 Heisman trophy as the nation's top college football player. Born to blind parents, he worked several part-time jobs in high school to help support the family. Plunkett capped a storybook college career by leading Stanford to a 1971 Rose Bowl upset of previously undefeated Ohio State. He played in the NFL for 16 seasons, achieving his greatest success during his nine seasons with the Oakland Raiders, whom he helped lead to two Super Bowl victories.

The Super Bowl MVP recalls joining Delta Tau Delta as a critical moment in his life that helped him prepare them for the NFL's biggest stage. Jim Plunkett tells his personal story including his Fraternity:

"The defining moment of my career wasn't something that happened on a football field. It was the day I walked into the Delta Tau Delta fraternity house during my sophomore year at Stanford. Before that point, I was a poor, introverted kid who had started to feel like I didn't belong at that school. After it, I had such a strong support group that I can honestly say the guys in that house helped save my life.

What many people don't realize about Stanford is that it didn't always offer full athletic scholarships. When I was in school in the early 1970s, there were plenty of players who had to help pay for their education by working part-time jobs. Some kids worked in the athletic department while others cleaned up tables in local restaurants. In fact, I was so broke that I had to take out student loans during my final two years of school and I also spent one semester living with my parents in San Jose.

But money was just one of the main reasons I felt out of place at Stanford. I honestly think I came to that university

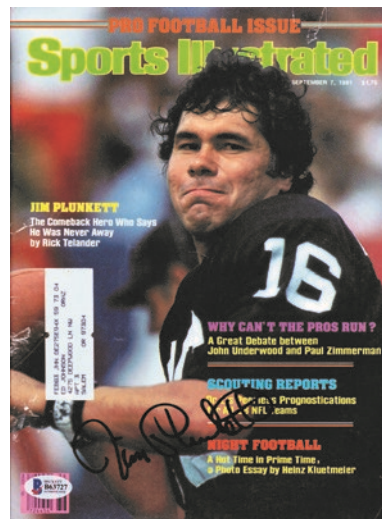
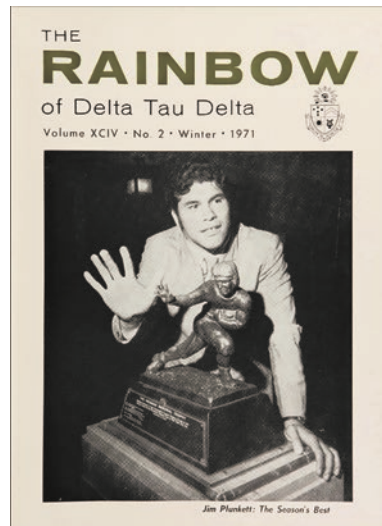

with a lot of pressure on my shoulders. It's no secret that both my parents were blind when I grew up and I always believed I had to resolve a lot of problems by myself. It's not that I didn't feel loved by them. It's just that they could do only so much to help.

So as things got harder for me at Stanford, I started to feel like my dreams were dying. I had a tumor removed during an operation in my first year on campus. I also was a fourth-string quarterback as a freshman and the offense was more suited for mobile players who could roll out instead of traditional drop-back passers like myself. And when you factored in all the other issues that I was dealing with off the field, I honestly can say the frustration was mounting quickly.

So when I joined Delta Tau Delta, I didn't have any idea what the house could



do for me. I was simply looking for a place to belong and I wound up finding all these friends, many of whom were athletes like myself. They helped keep my confidence up and they made me realize that I could succeed at Stanford. When I think back to how much they did for me -- even if it was something as small as letting me borrow a car -- I often wonder what would've happened if I'd signed on with a different fraternity.

See, I don't think it's a coincidence that my playing career took off in the years after I became a Delta Tau Delta member. I just felt better about myself and the opportunities

on the field started to come more easily. In fact, I became even more comfortable on the field, as the coaches changed the offense prior to my junior year to accentuate my strengths. Suddenly, the shy kid with few friends was the leader of the team.

But even now, I give a lot of credit to the guys in that house. They kept my spirits up and they didn't let me get so low that transferring or quitting became a viable solution to my problems. So when I think about all the things that happened to me on the professional level -- from being the top pick in the 1971 draft to resurrecting my career in Oakland -- I always look back to those times with fond memories. Aside from my real family, the young men in that house were some of the most important people ever to enter my life."

DR. ROBERT D. BURNS CELEBRATION OF LIFE - EVENT RECAP



On September 28th, a Celebration of Life service for Dr. Robert D. Burns (1929-2019) was held at the Delta Tau Delta Lodge. Known to many on campus as “Doc Burns,” Burns arrived at Kenyon College in 1963 as a professor of biology. Doc Burns was eventually chosen by Chi Chapter as their faculty advisor in 1974. For almost 30 years, Doc Burns served as faculty chapter advisor. Upon his retirement in 1992, Kenyon awarded Doc Burns emeritus status and an honorary Doctor of Science degree. In 2010 he served as campaign chairman of the Securing Our Future capital campaign.
