Ben Heber Cummins Inc.— Sourcing Manager LJC Class Year: 2013

Describe your current professional role/responsibilities:

I negotiate multi-million dollar construction contracts for Cummins including recent projects like the new Cummins Indianapolis office building. I also lead strategic projects to optimize our construction procurement process globally.

Tell us about your Duke University program and why you decided to pursue it:

It is a global MBA program where we study business classes and focus on issues around the world. We meet for 1 week out of every 10 weeks someplace around the world. We have online study between the in person visits. I have been to China and Chile in the program, and will be in India in April and Germany in June. We go to these places to understand the diversity of culture and business practices. Just like we work on in LJC we focus on understanding people's culture, and preferences best when we are in the setting.

I decided to pursue this program for a variety of reasons. First is that I wanted to expand my impact to have the biggest possible influence on those around me. With Duke's reputation, and the style of program itself, I feel Duke is the right tool for me now.

Second, this program has many parallels to the LJC format, and I wanted to continue to learn in this way. Much like LJC does monthly onsite in person meetings, the MBA does periodic in person, on location visits. Duke is also very team oriented and I enjoyed that part of LJC as well, so I thought it would be a good fit.

What charities or organizations are you currently involved in:

Windrose Health Network– Board Member Jan 2015 – Present. Windrose is a wonderful primary care network focusing on the underserved in our community. I serve as the Quality Committee Leader. I found this volunteer opportunity through the LJC newsletter.

Johnson County CIT Leader – Cummins – Leading a multi-tier volunteer organization to increase Cummins impact in Johnson County. Focusing on Education, Social Justice, and the Environment. We have 800+ employees who live in Johnson County, and we want to leverage them and others to make a strategic difference.

Social Impact Club Leader – MBA Club – Lead fundraising for charitable organizations, bring in speakers in social impact space to our meetings around the world, working leading a volunteer event while we are in India.

United Way – Cummins liaison for the past 4 years with UWJC. Increased engagement with Cummins employees in annual campaign. Cummins Leader for Day of Caring for the last 2 years. Loaned Executive in 2014.

As you can see above most of my volunteering is event and organization coordination. I do not get many "action shots" as most of the time is spent sitting at a table in meetings or in front of my computer.

Why did you take the LJC course and what did you gain from the experience:

For me, going to LJC was driven by a burden of mine to look for ways that I could use my resources to make a positive difference around me. LJC provided incredible tools to develop my overall community value.

What advice would you give a current or future class member:

You will know when you are ready for LJC. The time commitment is a great gauge. If you are looking for ways to make the time commitment work in your schedule, you are ready to use the tools. If instead you are looking for a way to complete it with the minimum time needed, you should wait. It will take more time to apply what you learned after you graduate than it takes to learn it, so please be prepared to make the time happen.

How would you describe your leadership style or philosophy:

I lead with an open hand. Whatever I bring to the table (time, knowledge, connections), I will share with the team. At the same time, I ask people around me to use what resources they have currently available, to gain new resources, and to share them with others as much as possible.

Who is a current leader in Johnson County that you admire and why:

I admire people who look to draw the best out of those they come in contact with. I have many friends, colleagues and church leaders who have done that. My wife has been an extraordinary support to me at home. Without her encouragement and foundational partnership, I would not be able to help the community outside the home. From a public setting I met Bonnie Pribush at a critical point in my development and she embodies that ability to make other people better around her.

What do you like to do in your down time:

I have given up my down time. I do love spending time with my kids, working on our hobby farm and watching re-runs of old TV shows with my wife.

What are your future plans - personally and/or professionally:

I look forward to building my impact on the community and the world.

With the completion of my business degree I plan on applying it in a professional management role.
