BECOMES 43RD FRATERNITY PRESIDENT

Dr. Aaron Clevenger, *Central Florida '97*, was elected to serve as the 43rd Delta Upsilon International Fraternity President during the Assembly of Trustees on July 25, 2026, as part of the Leadership Institute in Milwaukee, Wisconsin. He first joined the Fraternity's Board of Directors in 2012 and served as Board Secretary from 2019-2026.

In his professional career, Aaron is the Assistant Provost for International Education at Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University and holds an appointment as an associate professor in Security Studies and International Affairs. Brother Clevenger holds a Bachelor of Arts and a Master of Arts from the University of Central Florida, a Master of Science from Embry-Riddle, and a Doctor of Education from Benedictine University.

As an undergraduate, Aaron was a founding member of Delta Upsilon's Central Florida Chapter. Through the years, he has served the Fraternity in a number of volunteer capacities, including Chapter Advisor, Alumni Chapter President, and House Corporation President for the Central Florida Chapter; Province Governor; educational programs facilitator; and International Fraternity Board member. Aaron has also served as a member of the professional staff for both the International Fraternity and Educational Foundation.

Brother Clevenger's professional experience in higher education and extensive Fraternity staff and volunteer service make him uniquely poised for the role.

Derrick joined the Board of Directors in 2021 and works in fundraising/advancement at Vanderbilt University. New to the Board of Directors are Colin Finn, *Iowa State* '05, as Alumni Director and Michael Gates, *Kansas* '27, and Shane Simpson, *San Jose* '27, as Undergraduate Directors.

Retiring from the Fraternity's Board of Directors is Tom Durein, *Oregon State* '92, who served as the 42nd Fraternity President from 2018-2026. Tom joined the Board of Directors in 2015 following service on the DU Educational Foundation Board of Trustees from 1998-2015. Now a Past Fraternity President, he has now rejoined the Board of Trustees.

During his term as Fraternity President, Tom led DU with energy, strength and stability. He helped DU navigate a global pandemic that significantly shifted both Fraternity operations and the higher education landscape. Tom also helped spearhead the Fraternity's current strategic plan and was a key figure in the success of the DUEF's historic Ignite The Charge Campaign, which raised more than \$10 million for Fraternity programs and initiatives.

Professionally, Tom is a former Greek Advisor for the University of California, Berkeley and a past DU International Headquarters staff member having served in a variety of expansion, member development and Foundation roles. Today, he is a Vice President of Account Management for NetJets, Inc.

The *Delta Upsilon Quarterly* team sat down with new International Fraternity President Aaron Clevenger, *Central Florida '97*, to discuss his vision for DU's future.



What does it mean for you to become Delta Upsilon's International Fraternity President?

I am honored by the confidence the Fraternity has placed in me as the next President. Delta Upsilon has been a defining part of my life for more than 30 years. It has given me lifelong friendships, opportunities to lead and serve, and countless opportunities for personal and professional growth. What vision do you have for the future of Delta Upsilon?

As we look ahead, I believe our responsibility is to preserve the values and principles that have defined Delta Upsilon for nearly 200 years while ensuring they remain relevant to today's students and alumni members. Our goal cannot be to simply maintain our traditions, but to strengthen the undergraduate and alumni experience and clearly demonstrate the lifelong value of Delta Upsilon membership.

The future of Delta Upsilon depends on our ability to think strategically while remaining true to who we are. I look forward to working with the Fraternity Board of Directors, the Foundation Board of Trustees, our talented staff, volunteers, alumni, and undergraduate members to strengthen Delta Upsilon as a resilient, well-governed fraternity focused on developing men of merit.

Our work does not end there. We must continue to expand our number of undergraduate chapters, increase the number of initiated members in each chapter, and retain undergraduate members throughout their undergraduate experience. We must also invest in innovative programs; meaningful membership education; and services that prepare our members to lead, serve and contribute throughout their lives.

If we remain committed to these priorities while staying true to our Founding Principles, we will position Delta Upsilon to thrive throughout its third century and ensure our brotherhood continues to enrich the lives of members for generations to come.



DELAWARE

REINSTALLED

Delta Upsilon welcomed the Delaware Chapter back into its active chapter roster when the Reinstallation Ceremony was held on April 12, 2026, marking 56 years and one day since its original Installation. The Delaware Chapter began as DU's 102nd chapter on April 11, 1970, and eventually closed in 1983.

During its time as an associate chapter, the group's resiliency helped lead it to reinstallation. In its first test, the chapter's return almost ended before it even started. Expansion recruitment efforts, which had been set to begin in 2020, were delayed by a year due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Recruitment finally began in spring 2021, with the Associate Chapter Ceremony being held on Nov. 12, 2021.

Once reestablished, the associate chapter continued to face challenges as it navigated forming a brotherhood, the remaining effects of the pandemic, and a university suspension. Fortunately, with the help of university administration, Fraternity staff, and alumni advisors, the group remained resolved in the desire to become a rechartered chapter.

"Rechartering has been an incredible milestone for our chapter, but we view it as the beginning rather than the finish line," said Chapter President Sean Smith, *Delaware '27*. "The Delaware Chapter of Delta Upsilon is a group of driven, resilient and values-based men who are committed to building something meaningful on campus."

During the Reinstallation Ceremony, Rite II of the Initiation Ceremony is also held for three new brothers. During his Charge Address, International Fraternity

Board Chairman Brad John, *Iowa '96*, reiterated Brother Smith's sentiments on resiliency.

"In the years ahead, you will encounter challenges," John said. "You will face decisions that test your resolve. You will be presented with opportunities to choose the easier path or the right one. In those moments, recall this night. Recall the Principles you pledged to uphold. Recall the trust placed in you by this Fraternity and by one another."

"Delta Upsilon does not ask for perfection," John continued. "It asks for integrity. It asks for effort. It asks for the courage to live your values consistently and openly. If you do so, you will not only honor this Fraternity; you will strengthen it. You will not only build a chapter; you will build a legacy."

The ceremonies were held on campus in Smith Hall 120 in front of friends, family and alumni. In total, 79 men were listed as Founding Fathers for the rechartered group.

The Ritual Team for the ceremonies included DU Executive Director Justin Kirk, *Boise State '00*, as Master; Chapter Advisor Edward Lach, *NC State '79*, as Examiner; Past Chapter President Jackson Schreiner, *Delaware '26*, as Chief Marshal; and VP Membership Education Christopher Gardner, *Delaware '28*, as Chaplain.

As the chapter moves toward the future, it looks to continue its resolve in creating a strong DU brotherhood on campus.



"My vision is for the Delaware Chapter to become one of the premier fraternities at the University of Delaware while staying true to Delta Upsilon's values," Smith said. "I want to see continued growth in membership, leadership, academic achievement and campus involvement. Most importantly, I hope we create a lasting culture where future generations of brothers are proud of the foundation we have built and continue to elevate the chapter for years to come."

JUSTICE IN ACTION SERVICE GRANTS

ARLINGTON AND PURDUE CHAPTERS SUPPORT THEIR COMMUNITIES

In spring 2025, Delta Upsilon announced the creation of the Justice in Action Service Grant Program that is designed empower DU chapters to create meaningful, service-based projects in their communities. After submitting grant proposals and presenting to a panel of judges at the 2025 Leadership Institute, the Arlington and Purdue chapters were granted the inaugural Justice in Action Service Grants for projects to be held in the 2025-2026 academic year.

ARLINGTON

The Arlington Chapter used its grant money to work on two different projects. The first was called Gobble Wobble, where the chapter worked with its long-standing partner, South Davis Elementary, to provide Thanksgiving meals to students and their families. With the grant money and additional alumni support, the chapter purchased and distributed 85 turkeys to families facing food insecurity. Through the partnership, the chapter worked with the Arlington Independent School District who provided warehouse storage for distribution day, as well as South Davis staff who directed traffic and coordinated recipient check-in.

The chapter also purchased PE equipment and supplies for the school, which were presented in January 2026.

For its second project, the Arlington Chapter worked with Arlington Life Shelter on a project called Ham It Up! On five different dates throughout the academic year, the chapter worked to make and distribute ham sandwiches and personal hygiene kits to shelter residents. In total, the chapter provided 1,000 sandwiches.

As part of the grant program, chapters receiving funds must submit an impact report after completing the service project. Between both projects, the Arlington Chapter reported that the service strengthened brotherhood; deepened the chapter's understanding of justice, friendship and culture; and developed their character to build a lasting tradition of service rooted in partnership and responsibility.



South Davis Elementary's principal Kelly Kalisse said, "The South Davis Gobble Wobble makes a real difference for our families every Thanksgiving. The event was organized, respectful and efficient. Many parents expressed deep appreciation—some shared that this would allow them to use limited funds for other immediate needs like utilities and school supplies. We are grateful for the chapter's partnership."



PURDUE

The Purdue Chapter used its Justice in Action funds to promote science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) to third grade students at McClelland Elementary School in Indianapolis. This particular school is a Title 1 school with 72 percent of its students coming from a low-income household. The chapter connected with McClelland thanks to Lee Stuart, *Purdue '98*, who works at the school.

For their project, the chapter purchased STEM kits that focused on engineering, elementary coding and natural science/chemistry. Chapter brothers then visited the school every Tuesday, Thursday and Friday from Sept. 30-Nov. 19 to help the students work through the kits.



On Tuesdays, students used autonomous toy cars to learn how to create letter patterns using colored mats and robots as a way to introduce them to coding in an easy-to-understand, physical way. On Thursdays, the kits were used to help build bridges and other small construction projects. Then on Fridays, natural science and chemistry demonstrations/experiments involved concepts like pH, acidity, and basic carbon dioxide reactions.

Throughout the course of the project, 18 brothers consistently participated every week, with additional brothers joining when available. Ten women from Kappa Delta also joined the DUs. The brothers—many of whom are STEM majors—enjoyed getting to serve through the project.

“Being able to connect with the kids and make an impact was really special,” said chapter member Gabe Goffin, *Purdue '28*. “You could see how much the kids loved the experience. Coordinating with Lee Stuart and the other teachers of McClelland Elementary was a fantastic learning opportunity. I can’t wait to see how this project adapts with time.”

Expansion News

Associate Chapter Ceremony held for Fullerton & Michigan State

Delta Upsilon held the Associate Chapter Ceremony for both the Fullerton and Michigan State Associate Chapters in spring 2026 as the groups continue to work their way toward chartering.

Delta Upsilon's associate chapter at California State University, Fullerton marks the first time the Fraternity has been a part of that campus community. DU joins four other fraternities as part of the campus IFC. The Multicultural Greek Council has eight groups, the National Pan-Hellenic Council has two groups, and the Panhellenic Council has six sororities.

Expansion recruitment at CSUF began in spring 2026 with DU Leadership Consultant Axel Hoge, *Arlington '25*, leading the efforts. The Associate Chapter Ceremony was held on April 11, 2026, with 15 associate members.

Delta Upsilon's Michigan State Chapter at Michigan State University first chartered as the Fraternity's 70th chapter on Jan. 15, 1949. It was last active in 2006. While Fraternity staff have long kept an eye on the viability to reopen the chapter, in late spring 2025, a group of students at MSU approached DU about affiliating with the Fraternity. Throughout that summer and fall, staff worked closely with the young men as the campus Interfraternity Council worked through its process to bring another fraternity onto campus.

DU was officially approved to return to campus in spring 2026, and the Associate Chapter Ceremony was held on April 18 with 26 associate members. Throughout the fall 2026 term, the associate chapter will receive enhanced chapter support from the Fraternity as it works to set up operations, continue recruitment and engage chapter alumni.

NORTH DAKOTA

As part of the chapter house renovation a few years ago, the North Dakota Chapter created a space where it could host cultural events. In February, the chapter partnered with the Community Foundation of Grand Forks and the United Way to launch “Music With a Mission,” a musical salon to showcase and raise money for a local charity. Cornell '57

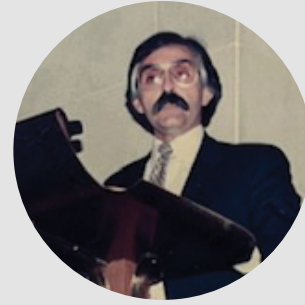
Brother Anthony (Tony) Cashen, Cornell '57, passed away March 23, 2026, surrounded by family. He served on the Delta Upsilon Educational Foundation Board of Trustees from 2007-2012, and was a longtime volunteer for the Cornell Chapter.

Born Oct. 26, 1935, Tony grew up in Eastchester, New York. From an early age, farming became an integral part of his life. As a teenager, he helped oversee his family farm in Claverack, New York, before enrolling at Cornell University to major in Agricultural Economics. He earned his bachelor's in 1957 and a master's degree in 1958. He went on to have a successful career in investment management and executive recruiting, retiring in 2000 from Lamalie Associates. During the last 15 years of his career, he commuted to New York City from his farm in Austerlitz, New York.

Illinois '68

Brother Stephen Kouzomis, Illinois '68, passed away April 18, 2026, at his home in St. Louis. He served on the Delta Upsilon International Fraternity Board of Directors from 1998-2004.

He was born June 10, 1946, in Kankakee, Illinois, and went on to graduate from the University of Illinois in 1968. During his time at Illinois, he served Delta Upsilon as Chapter President. Allan Warrack

Alberta '61

Brother Allan Warrack, Ph.D., *Alberta '61*, passed away July 24, 2026. He served Delta Upsilon as a former staff member (1961-1962 and 2002-2003), a member of DU Educational Foundation Board of Trustees (1990-1991), and a member of the International Fraternity Board of Directors (1999-2002).

Allan was born May 24, 1937, outside of Langdon, Alberta. He started his post-secondary education at Olds College, then received his bachelor's from the University of Alberta. He then served a year as a Field Secretary for Delta Upsilon before earning his master's and Ph.D. from Iowa State University.

Allan spent much of his career in higher education, spending over three decades at the University of Alberta teaching agricultural economics and business economics. He later served as an Associate Dean and Vice-President of Administration. He spent one year as Delta Upsilon's Interim Executive Director in 2002-2003 as the Fraternity led a search for a full-time replacement.

Dr. Warrack was elected twice to the Alberta Legislature. In his first term, he was appointed Minister of Lands and Forests. In his second term, he served as Minister of Utilities and Telephones. He later served on the government's National Research Council. In 2005, he was awarded an Outstanding Albertan Centennial Medal and was named a Distinguished Delta Upsilon.

"If there ever was something that Allan could do for DU, he just did it and did it very well—locally for Alberta and at the Delta Upsilon International level," said Alberta Alumni Chapter representatives in a message to all Alberta alumni. "For Alberta, Allan was big time involved with all the major DU Alberta projects. Allan was always a brother you could call on to do the work, for guidance or a second opinion. We all know Allan will be watching his Delta Upsilon International Fraternity from above and celebrating DU Alberta continuing to build better men."

Delta Upsilon recognized by FCA

The Fraternity Communications Association (FCA) honored Delta Upsilon with two awards during its Annual Conference in May 2026. FCA is a professional development association for communications and marketing professionals working at Greek-letter organizations.
