# Class Review Massage Therapy and Pathology by Diane Zeni, LMT

Ruth Werner brought a wealth of knowledge and a sense of humor to each of the three courses she taught at the Annual Wisconsin Chapter Meeting and Educational Conference in February. Excellent teachers have a flair for the dramatic and with her background in theater, Ruth kept the attention of her students by bringing enthusiasm and excitement to subjects that could have been considered to be a little on the dry side. By asking and answering questions and encouraging dialog throughout her presentations she brought the information to life.

In the first session which focused on reproductive health in men and women, Ruth covered a variety of relatively common diseases, including prostate and testicular cancer, dysmenorrhea and osteoporosis, among others. After a thorough discussion of each topic, the benefits of massage or the contraindications for it were addressed.

The second session was entitled <u>The Ethics of Client Communication: Talking to People About Their Health</u>. This was an interactive class that gave us a chance to test our acting skills. We each had an opportunity to role-play both a challenging client and a therapist needing to set boundaries regarding situations when massage is contraindicated or must be adjusted for client and/or therapist safety. Practicing what to say, and especially how to say it was a useful reminder that we need to communicate thoughtfully and sensitively with our clients concerning difficult issues.

The third session, <u>Massage Therapy and Pathology: Psychiatric Disorders</u>, covered anxiety disorders, chemical dependency, depression and eating and sleep disorders. These are all disorders that we as massage therapists are likely to encounter in some of our clients. We learned that in many cases massage can be very beneficial for people with these disorders, but that there can be risks involved as well. The subject matter was covered in depth, and always from a massage therapy perspective, making the topics real and relevant.

I would definitely attend other classes given by Ruth Werner. Her manner is friendly and open and as the author of <u>A Massage Therapist's Guide to Pathology</u> she is an amazing source of information delivered clearly and completely.

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


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
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### The AMTA Purpose

## Ethical Dimensions By Kathy Ginn, L.M.T., NCTMB

The season of spring is upon us. Spring feels like a blessing for the senses. Our senses feast on the warmth of the sun, the sound of the birds and the cool dirt on our hands. It is important to thank "old man winter" who gives away to

the spring. Each season has its gifts and purpose ~ I am grateful for the rhythm of the seasons.

Many of you have been following me for some time now. You may have come upon my writing or perhaps have attended one of my ethics offerings. You may remember I use the

circle along with the rhythm of the seasons as a metaphor to illustrate the complexity and richness of the client – therapist relationship.

The Celtic world has always been fascinated with circles. Circles are prevalent in so much of its artwork. The Celtic mind seems to have a wonderful respect for the mystery of the circle. The circle is one of the oldest and most powerful symbols. John O'Donohue writes in his book; Anam Cara:

The world is a circle; the sun and moon are too. Even time itself has a circular nature; the day and the year build to a circle. At its most intimate level so is the life of each individual. The circle never gives itself completely to the eye or to the mind but offers a trusting hospitality to that which is complex and mysterious; it embraces depth and height together. The circle never reduces the mystery to a single direction or preference.

John's words affirm my thoughts and ideas of the circular nature of the client-therapist relationship. Our relationship with our clients has a quality of intimacy, complexity and mystery. It is important to never underestimate the power of these energies. The therapeutic relationship embraces depth and richness. His words raise a question within my heart;

Is there a simple and single direction to the study and exploration of ethics? <u>Please pause and consider this question.</u>

In my experience, the study of ethics is multi-dimensional and so much more. Ethics concerns the inter-relationship with ones-self and another. The study of ethics integrates our values to actions; our interior life to the external. As a teacher of ethics, I do not see myself as exclusive or elitist

~ I simply have immense passion for this rich and juicy topic. I often offer my students more questions than give direct answers. There lies immense power in an open question. The very process of questioning can itself teach us openness and wonder. Even questions have a season and rhythm to them. Following are a few questions I would like to ask you as you continue to explore this vast and dynamic topic of ethical development.

What takes place when a seed is put into the ground? You are asked to plant 5 seeds of virtue ~ can you name your 5 seeds?

How do you nurture and develop your interior life? When is the last time you read the professional code of ethics?

Is the professional code of ethics visible in your place of work?

What statement best describes your interior code of ethics?

How is your interior code of ethics made visible?

Our profession has blessed us with a code of ethics. I call this lived wisdom. At times this code is not enough when making ethical decisions. So here we are, faced with a piece of ethical development; the opportunity to create, name and live by your interior code of ethics.

I hope the above questions gently invite you into a space of curiosity and wonder. Remember – the answer is often found in the question.

May the season of spring invite you to discover your garden within.

nized at the National AMTA convention and is entered to possibly get the award at the National Level.



## Class Review PNMT by Joy Stoleson, LMT

Douglas Nelson's Precision Neuromuscular Therapy (PNMT) class on the Lower Extremities covered all 3 days of the AMTA WI Chapter Conference. The Lower Extremities seminar is one of the five Core Series that Douglas Nelson offers. For those of you not familiar with Douglas Nelson, he has been a licensed Massage Therapist since 1977 and is the president of BodyWorks Associates in Champaign, IL. It is this facility where he conducts the clinical research that ensures the efficacy of this approach as well as increased knowledge and improvement of current practice.

PNMT is an approach to soft tissue therapy that requires palpation skills, anatomical knowledge and clinical reasoning to determine the best course of treatment for musculoskeletal pain. Through development of the skills taught through this seminar, individualized treatment can be determined when combined with deductive reasoning and client feedback.

We covered the historical context of NMT, including the work of Raymond Nimmo, Janet Travell, and Paul St. John. We also reviewed the basics of muscle and neural physiology, as well as treatment basics and palpation techniques.

The seminar was evenly divided between hands-on learning techniques and classroom instruction.

Hands-on learning involved assessment testing and Range of Motion (ROM) evaluation as well as the palpation techniques for specific muscles, ligaments, and fascia. Areas covered included assessments to determine neural involvement or arthritic changes, tests to determine muscle weaknesses and palpation of tissue to find and correct trigger points (TrP's) in the lower extremities (hips, legs, feet). The hands-on training also highlighted another important skill: the importance of palpating and conducting assessments on a multitude of subjects, thereby gaining valuable experience in how people differ.

Classroom instruction included real life scenarios and research study findings as well as detailed anatomical characteristics of each highlighted muscle. One of the things I most enjoy about Mr. Nelson's classroom teaching style, is his use of functional anatomy... his ability to illustrate musculoskeletal movement and the effect that pathology or dysfunction has on not only the affected muscle, but the kinetic chain or whole body system.

Muscle groups studied included the deep hip rotators, the gluteus complex, hamstring complex, adductors, abductors, quadriceps, leg and foot musculature. Key lig



# Class Review Acu-Neurol Technique with Dr. XiPong Zhou by Sharon Loftus, LMT

The Director and Co-Founder of the East-West Healing Arts Institute, Dr. XiPong Zhou, found himself in the United States in 1993 with \$400.00 and the conviction that he would teach us "westerners" the power of the Body, Mind and Spirit, using traditional Eastern healing with modern Western Science. I chose this class because this is a modality that I know little about. I found the class very interesting as he tried to make us understand the concepts.

The techniques and strokes developed for Acu-Neurol was derived by Dr. Zhou from TuiNa (Chinese Medical Massage). These strokes, fast in the application, but slow moving across the body, were applied to the top 10 Acupressure points along specific Chinese Meridians for mind and body. "Manipulations acting on specific acupressure points to regulate the qi (enery) of the meridian (pathways) to balance the body's sympathetic and parasympathetic nerves and to achieve the body's yin/yang harmony and physical and emotional balance." (Acu-Neurol Glossary<sup>TM</sup>)

The class was very evenly divided between instruction, demonstration and hands-on. Dr. Zhou's two teaching assistants, Sara and Allan were extremely knowledgeable and helpful. I felt myself comparing the techniques to what we would consider normal massage lingo. Ji Fa is a "striking" technique more commonly known as Tapotement or Percussion. This included strokes like cupping, tapping and chopping. Na Fi is the "lifting" technique or Skin Rolling. Na Fa is "grasping" or kneading. The difference is where you applied the technique, to follow the meridian that would be most affected.

Acupressure is about 50% as effective as Acupuncture. The techniques Dr. Zhou developed enhanced the effectiveness by being able to feel a deeper massage with less pressure. I truly enjoyed this session and thank Dr. Zhou for adjusting his schedule to accommodate our request to watch the Superbowl!
