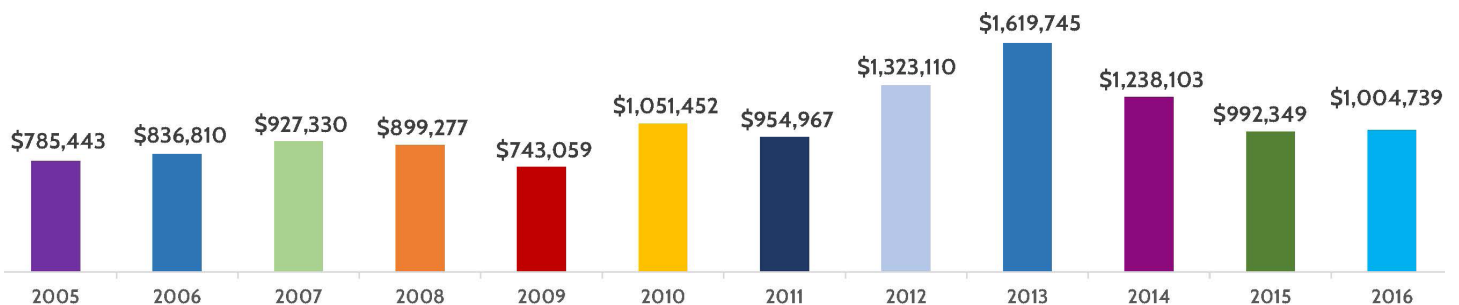

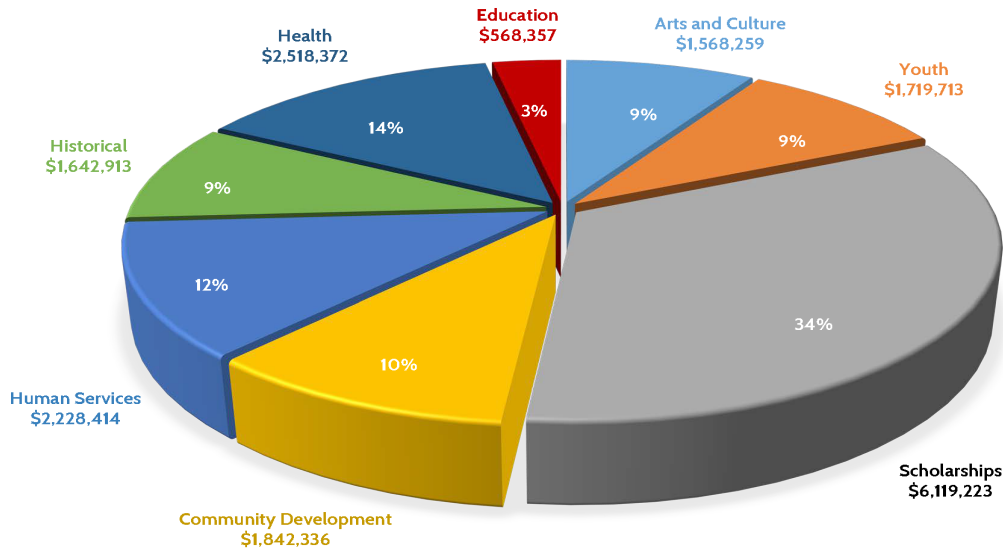

Agency	Grant Highlights	Total Since 1991
Animal Welfare League	\$150,000 was awarded for the construction of the current facility, followed by many grants for improvements and equipment over the years. In addition, the James Moore Fund for the AWL and the Muttgomery Pet Paws Fund are two designated funds that make contributions annually.	\$ 317,517
Crawfordsville Main Street	Marie Canine Plaza, startup funds for Athens Art Gallery and downtown beautification.*	\$ 455,744
General Lew Wallace Study and Museum	Construction of the Carriage House, replacement of the copper domed roof, historic structures report, and programming. Restoration of original paintings on the interior dome of the Study was completed in 2015.	\$ 275,425
Half Way Home	Grants helped to put a new roof on the building purchased in 2015 and funded salaries once they opened in 2016. Half Way Home is a 180-day residential facility for women striving for a drug-free, sober, and self-sufficient lifestyle	\$ 48,400
Ladoga Clark Township Public Library	A 2016 grant of \$40,700 will help fund a variety of improvements to the building that will focus on increasing energy efficiencies.	\$ 43,200
Montgomery County Free Clinic	Construction of the Dr. Mary Ludwig Free Clinic, salaries for both an Advance Practice Nurse and a dental assistant, and software.*	\$ 1,445,243
Montgomery County Historical Society	Various grants have funded building improvements and repairs, purchased equipment and supplies, and have supported programming. The Historical Society is a beneficiary of the Max K. Tannenbaum Restricted Fund along with the Montgomery County Cultural Foundation.	\$ 858,880
Mountie Mission	A grant in 2007 helped purchase and make improvements to the building Mountie Mission currently occupies in Ladoga. In 2016, they received a \$5,000 grant in support of the Back to School Backpack program, which supplied 455 children with backpacks, school supplies, and clothing.	\$ 52,019
Sugar Creek Players	Improvements have been made to the Vanity Theater, including roof replacement and repairs, and a fire protection sprinkler system. They are currently working to develop a Comprehensive Plan for the Vanity Theater buildings.	\$ 139,011
Sunshine Vans	Matching dollars for van purchases, radio equipment, and a garage.	\$ 140,180
Youth Service Bureau	Funding for CASA (Court Appointed Special Advocates) and JUMP (Juvenile Mentoring Program) programs benefiting hundreds of at-risk children in the county. Support for the Alternative School, a collaborative effort among YSB and all three public school districts.*	\$ 310,208
