



Ethical Dimensions

This column often responds to questions sent to me by Massage Therapists regarding the dynamics of the

therapeutic relationship. This month, however, I have decided to invite you to pause and reflect on our profession as a whole. Together let's take a look at the many changes which have taken place over the past many years, along with the current legislative proposal here in Wisconsin: changes in relationship to consumer use of mas-

sage therapy; public knowledge and understanding of the massage therapy profession; the diverse reasons people seek our services; the cost of massage therapy; the growing professional opportunities for those seeking to make a solid and meaningful career choice; the enormous responsibility we have as massage therapists; and many more. With these many changes, I feel it is important to reflect on the topic of legal recognition in the context of regulation. If you have been following Betsy Krizenesky's dedication, hard work, and updates over the last couple of years, you are well aware of the legislation in progress here in Wisconsin.

Although regulation can sometimes be confusing and frustrating, legal recognition of the massage therapy profession is good for everyone. This article attempts to ignite your curiosity, offer some "general" solid reasons, and perhaps weave my personal beliefs and thoughts regarding updating Wisconsin's massage therapy law to that of *practice protection*.

I believe it is fair to say that legal recognition and standards of competency offer a clear and meaningful way to talk about what we do, but most importantly protect both you and your client. Having laws in place raises the reputation of the massage therapy profession as a whole. As many of you know I have the opportunity of teaching both at TIBIA Massage School and East ~ West Healing Arts Institute, both located in Madison. The first day of my Ethics class I invite the students to pause and reflect on the following scenario: "Soon, you will have the situation where a friend, family member, or total stranger will give you almost total access to their naked body. What are your responsibilities and what are your client's responsibilities concerning this relationship?" This simple question is often not very simple to answer. Even to "seasoned" therapists, this question can be a reminder of the extraordinary and

often difficult dynamics of the therapeutic relationship.

With this in mind, imagine there was minimal regulation within our profession. Imagine there were people practicing massage therapy with limited professional training. This could lead to public confusion around professional titles and services that are offered. I invite you to look through the Yellow Pages and Isthmus magazine. Are you following me? Limited ethical accountability simply means one is not accountable to a code of conduct and professional standards. This, I believe, opens up situations where both client and therapist can be physically, emotionally and sexually hurt and violated with little or no consequences. Is this the profession we want to work in and represent?

Currently, Wisconsin is a *title protection* state. Essentially this means that those who have even as little as 20 hours of massage therapy education (just one example) can offer massage services to the public and charge the "going" rate. The only legal requirement affecting them is that they avoid using the protected titles, Massage Therapist or Bodyworker. Again, for me the larger issue is the probability of many people practicing with zero accountability to a written code of ethics, and the grave possibilities that often accompany this lack of professional standards. Doctors, nurses, lawyers, and other professionals do not allow for this short-cut ~ why should we?

This topic can often lead into a juicy and fired-up conversation. However, I do hope I have brought some clarity, ignited your thinking, and perhaps inspired you in some way to support the move to a practice protection state. Of the 43 other states, plus DC that regulate the profession, only 5 are not practice protected.

Massage Pioneer Andy Schaefer Dies

On May 15, 1972, long before massage became an accepted form of health care, Andrew Schaefer of Racine became a member of the AMTA. Andy served as Chapter President in 1980-1981, then served as 1st Vice President from 1981-1982 and again as President

from 1982 -1983 he also served as a Delegate to the National Convention in 1997. During his time with the AMTA-WI Chapter Andy was a vocal participant at just about every Chapter Meeting he attended; he always demonstrated a willingness to participate in the process of decision-making by voicing his opinions and concerns to the assembled membership. It has been a few years since Andy attended a Chapter Meeting but those of us who have been around for a bit recall Andy and Bill attending as a team offering warm hellos to everyone and engaging in discussions whenever the opportunity presented itself. Bill Shulak was Andy's friend, fellow instructor of therapeutic massage and companion to all of the events. Andy was legally blind; Bill served as Andy's extra set of eyes to help him traverse the massage table filled conference rooms.

Andy was the founder and lead instructor of the YMCA School of Swedish Massage in Racine. He retired from both his massage practice and teaching in 1999.

In a recent conversation with Bill Shulak following Andy's death, Bill recounted his memories of Andy. "Andy was the reason I became a massage therapist. My wife and I were regular clients of his and when I retired from the insurance business I decided to attend Andy's school. After I graduated Andy hired me as co-instructor, I taught there for 10 years."

Andy had a strong practice in Racine, his excellent technique and skill prompted him to start a massage training program, Bill explains "Andy was probably the most knowledgeable straight Swedish Massage Therapist I ever met and probably had the finest touch. When I took my Swedish practical to become an AMTA member (this requirement ended around 1992) the proctor could tell who trained me through the quality of my touch and my distinctive technique. Andy was a good man."

Andy passed away May 22, 2009, he will be missed by many.

A. Qualifications: Candidates for the Board of Directors and all Delegates must be Professional Members in good standing.

A candidate for the office of Chapter President shall 1) have held an elected office or appointed chair position on the AMTA-WI Chapter Board of Directors within the preceding four years and 2) hold active professional membership classification for one year prior to candidacy.

B. Duties: 1. Chapter officers are required to attend a minimum of four (4) Board Meetings annually, which include "conference call" board meetings and minimum of two (2) Chapter Meetings, except for good cause shown.

- 2. At both Chapter Meetings each officer will present a written report/s given orally of a summary of committee activities.
- 3. Each officer is required to contribute 2 written submissions annually for publication in the Chapter's newsletter.
- 4. Each Vice-President is required to Chair or Co-Chair one committee.

C. Benefits:

1. All Chapter Officers' registration fees for educational functions hosted by the Wisconsin Chapter will be waived if the requirements are met by the officers while in term. Non compliance of required duties, as defined by section B. 1,2,3 & 4 would result in benefits being revoked.

Chapter policy also allows that board members and committee chairs have expenses related to conducting Chapter business reimbursed including telephone, postage, supplies, and mileage for travel to meetings. Meals may also be provided as part of a board meeting.

Day Introduction to Traditional Thai Massage

as taught by Lyrea Crawford,

Traditional Thai Massage is a beautiful and elegant therapeutic healing modality. It dates back 2,500 years and is said to embody the practice of "loving-kindness." The work consists of slow rhythmic compressions on the muscles, gentle rocking, deep flowing stretches (similar to assisted yogic asanas) and thumb presses on specific energetic pathways. Traditional Thai Massage is performed in a quiet meditative atmosphere on a mat on the floor, enabling the practitioner to use graceful whole body movements and even pressure. If you wish to seek an officer position or run for delegate in February you must upgrade your membership to Professional prior to the Annual Chapter Meeting

An Informed Electorate

After the election at the Annual Chapter Meeting in Waukesha a member raised a question regarding how it is determined who will run for a delegate or Chapter Officer position. The questioner also asked whether solely taking nominations from the floor provided those present to vote, sufficient information upon which to make an informed decision. In an attempt to create a more fair and informed voting environment the AMTA-WI Chapter Board of Directors has decided to try a new strategy for the elections in February 2010.

If you wish to be nominated for a delegate position to the National Convention in 2011, to be held in Portland, Oregon: submit a brief description of yourself, including your reasons for seeking the position of delegate. Mail or email Amy Remillard (contact information on inside cover of newsletter) by February 1, 2010. The professional members present at the meeting will elect five delegates. Nominations from the floor will also be accepted; each can-

didate will be allowed a few minutes to verbally express their reasons for seeking the position. Responsibilities of delegates will be printed in the October and January issues of Connecting Hands.

Chapter Officer positions up for election in February 2010 will include, President, 2nd VP and Secretary, all positions require the candidate to be a professional member in good standing. In addition the position of President requires the candidate to have held an elected or appointed chair position on the AMTA-WI Chapter Board of Directors within the preceding four years and held professional member status one year prior to candidacy. To place yourself up for consideration please submit a brief description of yourself including your reasons for seeking the elected position of your choice. 
